SHORT TITLE: Amendments - Property Tax Credit for Credit for Disabled Law Enforcement Officers or Rescue Workers or Surviving Spouses of Fallen Law Enforcement Officers or Rescue Workers

AN ACT amending the Property Tax Credit for Credit for disabled law enforcement officers or rescue workers or surviving spouses of fallen law enforcement officers or rescue workers in order to align with State law; defining certain terms; amending certain definitions; amending the number of years of the disability or death that applies to the eligibility of a surviving spouse or cohabitant; making certain technical changes; and generally relating to property tax credits.



Section 1. Be It Enacted by the County Council of Howard County, Maryland, that the Howard County Code is amended as follows:

By amending:

Title 20. - “Taxes, Charges, and Fees”

Subtitle 1. “Real Property Tax; Administration, Credits, and Enforcement”

Section 20.119A. "Credit for disabled law enforcement officer or rescue worker or surviving spouse of fallen law enforcement officers or rescue workers."

Title 20. – Taxes, Charges and Fees

Subtitle 1. Real Property Tax; Administration, Credits, and Enforcement.

Section 20.119A. Credit for disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER or surviving spouse OR COHABITANT of fallen [[law enforcement officers or rescue workers]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS OR JUDICIAL OFFICERS.

(a) *Definitions.* In this section the following words have the meanings indicated:

(1) COHABITANT SHALL HAVE THE MEANING SET FORTH IN SECTION 9-210(A)(2) OF THE TAX-PROPERTY ARTICLE OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND.

([[1]]2) (i) *Disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]] PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER* means an individual who:

1. Has been found to be permanently and totally disabled by an administrative body or court of competent jurisdiction authorized to make such a determination; and
2. Became disabled:
 - a. As a result of or in the course of employment as a law enforcement [[officer or]]OFFICER, correctional officer, OR JUDICIAL OFFICER for any County or City in the State of Maryland or the State of Maryland; or
 - b. While in active service AS A JUDICIAL OFFICER OR WHILE IN THE ACTIVE SERVICE of a career or volunteer fire, rescue, or emergency medical service of any County or City in the State of Maryland or the State of Maryland.

(ii) *Disabled* [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]] PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER does not include an individual whose disability is the result of [[:

1. The individual's own willful misconduct or abuse of alcohol or drugs[; or

1 2. An occupational disease that did not result from an accidental injury within the
2 meaning of those terms under the Maryland Workers Compensation Act]].

3 ([2])3) (i) *Dwelling* means real property that:

4 1. Is the legal residence of a surviving spouse or disabled [[law enforcement or
5 rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER, A SURVIVING
6 SPOUSE, OR A COHABITANT; and
7 2. Is occupied by not more than two families.

8 (ii) *Dwelling* includes the lot or curtilage and structures necessary to use the real property
9 as a residence.

10 ([3])4) *Fallen* [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]] PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR
11 JUDICIAL OFFICER means an individual who dies:

12 (i) As a result of or in the course of employment as a law enforcement [[officer
13 or]]OFFICER, A correctional officer, OR A JUDICIAL OFFICER; or
14 (ii) While in the active service AS A JUDICIAL OFFICER OR WHILE IN THE ACTIVE SERVICE OF
15 a CAREER OR VOLUNTEER [[of a]] fire, rescue, or emergency medical service, unless
16 the death was a result of the individual's own willful misconduct or abuse of alcohol
17 or drugs.

18 (5) *JUDICIAL OFFICER* MEANS A JUDGE, MAGISTRATE OR DISTRICT COURT COMMISSIONER.

19 [[4) *Jurisdiction with reciprocity* means a jurisdiction in the State of Maryland that offers a
20 similar credit to a Howard County disabled law enforcement officer or rescue worker.]]

21 (6) *PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER* SHALL HAVE THE MEANING SET FORTH IN SECTION 9-210 OF THE
22 TAX-PROPERTY ARTICLE OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND.

23 ([5])7) *Surviving spouse* means a surviving spouse, who has not remarried, of a fallen [[law
24 enforcement officer or rescue worker]] PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER.

25 (b) *Credit*. In accordance with section 9-210 of the Tax-Property Article of the Annotated Code
26 of Maryland, an owner of real property may receive a property tax credit under this section
27 against the County property tax imposed on a dwelling if the owner is a disabled [[law
28 enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER or the
29 surviving spouse OR COHABITANT of a fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue
30 worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER and:

31 (1) The dwelling was owned by:

- (i) The disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER at the time the [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER was adjudged to be permanently and totally disabled; or
- (ii) The fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER at the time of the fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker's]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER'S death;

(2) (i) The disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER, fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER or the surviving spouse OR COHABITANT was domiciled in the State as of the date [[of]]OF, OR ANY TIME WITHIN THE FIVE YEARS BEFORE, the fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker's]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER's death or the disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker's]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER 's disability; and

(ii) The dwelling was acquired by the disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER or surviving spouse within[[two]]TEN years of the date the disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER was adjudged to be permanently and totally disabled or the fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker's]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER's death; [[or]]

(3) THE DWELLING WAS OWNED BY THE SURVIVING SPOUSE OR COHABITANT AT THE TIME OF THE FALLEN PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER'S OR JUDICIAL OFFICER'S DEATH; OR

(4) The dwelling was acquired after the surviving spouse, COHABITANT, or disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER qualified for a credit for a former dwelling under item [(1) or (2)] (1), (2), OR (3) of this subsection, to the extent of the previous credit.

3 (D) *TERM OF CREDIT.* THE TAX CREDIT CONTINUES UNTIL:

4 (1) THE SURVIVING SPOUSE REMARRIES;
5 (2) THE COHABITANT MARRIES OR COHABITATES WITH ANOTHER PERSON; OR
6 (3) THE PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER IS NO LONGER PERMANENTLY OR
7 TOTALLY DISABLED AS DETERMINED BY AN ADMINISTRATIVE BODY OR COURT OF
8 COMPETENT JURISDICTION AUTHORIZED TO MAKE SUCH A DETERMINATION.

9 (e) *Application.* A surviving spouse, COHABITANT, or disabled [[law enforcement officer or
10 rescue worker]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR JUDICIAL OFFICER:

11 (1) Is eligible for the tax credit beginning in the first taxable year after the date of the:
12 (i) Fallen [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker's]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR
13 JUDICIAL OFFICER's death; or
14 (ii) Disabled [[law enforcement officer or rescue worker's]]PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICER OR
15 JUDICIAL OFFICER's disability; and
16 (2) Shall apply for the tax credit on or before September 30 in the taxable year for which the
17 credit is requested to begin. ADDITIONAL APPLICATIONS ARE NOT REQUIRED DURING THE
18 TERM OF THE CREDIT.

19 (f) *Administration.*

20 (1) The Director of Finance shall develop an application form and establish procedures to
21 administer the tax credit established in this section.
22 (2) Notwithstanding subsection ([[d]]E) of this section, the Director of Finance may require
23 an individual who receives a tax credit under this section to provide evidence of
24 continued eligibility for the credit.

26 ***Section 2. And Be it Further Enacted*** by the County Council of Howard County, Maryland that
27 this Act shall be construed to apply retroactively and shall be applied to and interpreted to affect
28 all eligible property owners beginning in tax year 2025.

30 ***Section 3. And Be It Further Enacted*** by the County Council of Howard County, Maryland that
31 this Act shall become effective 61 days after its enactment.

The proposed legislation will bring the County into alignment with Section 9-210 of the Annotated Code of Maryland, Tax – Property Article (the “State law”). If the County implements the revised eligibility criteria, more homeowners may qualify for the credit. Specifically, the changes to be consistent with State Law are as follows:


1. State law now refers to “public safety officer or judicial officer” instead of “law enforcement officer or rescue worker.” This change in terminology does not remove anyone who is currently eligible in Howard County as a “law enforcement officer or rescue worker”.
2. State law extends the credit to disabled or fallen “Judicial Officers” which the State gives discretion to the County to define and which is defined in the bill as a Judge, Magistrate or District Court Commissioner.
3. State law extends the credit to the cohabitants of disabled or fallen public safety officers or judicial officers. Cohabitant is defined in State law as:
“An individual who for a period of at least 180 days in the year before the death of a fallen public safety officer or judicial officer:
 - (i) had a relationship of mutual interdependence with the fallen public safety officer or judicial officer; and
 - (ii) resided with the fallen public safety officer or judicial officer in the dwelling.”
4. State law also requires domicile within the State five years before the death or disability and that the dwelling be acquired within 10 years of the death or disability. This bill makes changes to our local credit to be consistent with these State provisions.

Fiscal Impact

The potential decrease in property tax revenue will depend on both the number of newly eligible recipients and the assessed value of their qualifying properties. There are currently 11 properties that qualify totaling \$59,309 in tax credits.


