AN ACT amending the Purchasing Code of Howard County in order to establish a Veteran-Owned Business Enterprise Program; to set forth the purpose of the Program; to define certain terms; to amend certain definitions to ensure consistency among the Purchasing Code, Purchasing Manual and Equal Business Opportunity Program Manual; to require the Purchasing Agent to take certain action; to set forth the elements of the Program; to establish certain Program goals; to prohibit certain actions and provide certain penalties; to amend the duties of the Commission for Veterans and Military Families in order to provide guidance to the Office of Purchasing regarding Veteran-owned businesses; and generally relating to the Purchasing Code of Howard County.

19 (D) *NOTIFICATION OF GOALS.* THE OFFICE OF PURCHASING SHALL NOTIFY THE PUBLIC AND
20 RESPONDENTS TO COUNTY SOLICITATIONS OF PROGRAM GOALS.

21 (E) *DATA.* THE OFFICE OF PURCHASING SHALL COLLECT AND MAINTAIN STATISTICAL DATA WHICH
22 SHALL MEASURE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PROGRAM.

23 (F) THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SUBTITLE DO NOT APPLY THE COUNTY'S PROCUREMENT PROCEDURES
24 TO THE EXTENT THAT THE COUNTY DETERMINES THAT THOSE PROVISIONS ARE IN CONFLICT WITH
25 AN APPLICABLE STATE OR FEDERAL PROGRAM.

26 (G) *PROCUREMENTS CONDUCTED BY FORMAL BIDDING.* PROCUREMENTS CONDUCTED BY FORMAL
27 BIDDING SHALL BE IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 4.107 OF THIS CODE.

3 VERIFICATION AND EVALUATION OF THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS
4 HAS ENGAGED IN ANY OF THE PROHIBITED ACTS SET FORTH IN SUBSECTION (K) OF THIS SECTION:

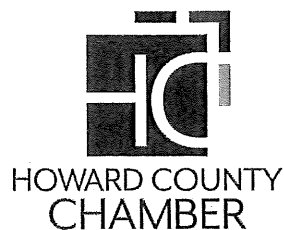

Last fall, the County Executive introduced CR121 which would amend the current Equal Business Opportunity Commission policy to include Veteran business owners. While the Chamber found County Executive Allan Kittleman's efforts commendable for furthering Veteran, Women, Minority, and Disabled business efforts in Howard County, the Chamber had several reservations with the policy as written. The Chamber subsequently issued the opinion that we thought it best if the County delayed the revision of the current EBOC ordinance. The administration subsequently withdrew the legislation and has since studied the issue further.

The Council now has before it a revised resolution and ordinance that addresses many of the concerns expressed before. The Chamber still believes the County can have more robust Veteran and Minority business policy if it were first to conduct a disparity study and implement the recommendations from the EBOC report. That aside, we support the current resolution and bill before you as it separates veteran and minority procurement concerns.

The Veteran-Owned Business Program is a goal oriented program which should expand opportunities for veteran owned businesses. Not to mention, the program is merit based as there are no set asides or price preferences. Under this program; outreach, counseling, and assistance will also be provided to Veteran owned businesses. For these reasons, the Chamber extends our support to this legislation and would like to see it receive favorable votes.


