East Columbia 50+ Center. While I recognize that these are difficult times requiring difficult solutions, it is unwise and unwarranted to cut the Center funding now for the following reasons:

- The construction on the East Columbia 50+ Center was set to begin this summer (2020). Reduced funding means that the Center cannot be built now causing a delay for the project of at least a year, perhaps longer. Delaying the project will increase the overall costs of construction. My name is Larry Corsa and I am president of the Heritage Green Townhouse Association. Our neighborhood is located directly across Cedar and Rivendell Lanes from Cedar Lane Park and the Harpers Choice MS grounds. I represent approximately 200 residents who have been following the North Columbia Fire Station project since we were made aware of it in 2017.

My community supports the need for a fire station serving northern Columbia, and agrees that a site on Route 108 offers the best access, despite traffic concerns. The proposed site for the fire station facility is located within the boundaries of Cedar Lane Park, and uses land from an existing turf field to save time and money; yet there is \$3M available in a contingency fund to build a replacement field and much more a half mile away on Harpers Choice MS grounds.

I am writing to support Amendment 14 to Council Bill CB25-2020 to require a "community outreach meeting including a public presentation and comment process on preliminary site plans". Friday's discussion of this amendment centered around the need for an open and transparent process that provides opportunity for community involvement. Councilman Jones indicated that he was not aware of any non-transparency in the process to date; Chief Anuszewski indicated that there was no intent to be non-transparent; Mr. Delerme stated that "we always have transparency on all our projects."; and Mr. Stromdahl said "I guess I don't necessarily agree that the process really hasn't been transparent" and later added that "we did push to get it into the planning board, so we could get it in this budget this year".

While I have lived in Howard County for twenty years, this fire station project has been my first exposure to the workings of Howard County Government. As an outside observer, the processes seem to be designed almost exclusively around the internal needs of the government participants, and are anything but transparent. I do not mean to imply any ill intent, but it has been a challenge the past three years to stay abreast of events to react in a timely manner, never mind to observe or affect the process in motion. I testified to the Planning Board on March 19th regarding the lack of proper notice and the need to take extraordinary measures in these extraordinary times, rather than as an excuse to do the minimum required.

I appreciate that the new site takes away a soccer field from the east area of Cedar Lane Park and I support the idea that replacement facilities and parking will be added to the west area by the Harpers Choice Middle School. However, the new fields bring along new roads and reconfigured intersections to the school grounds, and these impacts require much more information. I urge the Council to pass Amendment 14 to assure that these additional funds are spent in a manner that includes a large measure of community involvement.

Please oppose Amendment 12 to the budget. Specifically, zeroing out FY21 funding for C0329 "Energy Management Improvements" is bad for the environment and bad financially.

The Relamp of Long Reach Village Center and Other Critical buildings is another energy saving project cut by Amedment 12. It would install LED lighting and motion sensors. It is expected to save-\$65,000 annually and recoup its cost within two-years.

Amendment 12 also cuts the EV Charging Stations and Annual Charger Maintenance. It's a bad idea to skip maintenance. This also will allow the county to expand it EV fleet leading to reduction in fuel consumption and a reduction in CO2 emissions. It is expected to save \$470,000 annually.

Amendment 12 also cuts the Generation Conversions at Ascend One, Scaggsivile Public Safety Center, Detention Center and Public Safety Training Center. These upgrades will reduce the carbon emissions, save \$15,00 to \$30,000 annually, produce energy savings, and be cost neutral within 3 to 6 years.

Deferred maintenance and delaying desperately needed storm water management projects is another example of your choice to be pennywise and pound foolish -all it does is kick the can down the road to the next Council, only with a bigger bill, and leaves our children in crumbling facilities and homes at risk of flood - most of them in one district.

Additionally, regarding the latent print examiner, I was speaking to a PG county officer (they eliminated theirs due to budget) and they've had issues with delays in investigations due to having to send the work to other counties and then wait to get it back. Then when they wanted to rehire they ran into a long and costly recertification process and high demand that left then at a disadvantage in salary negotiations. Perhaps you should ask people familiar with the costs of not having one before you make a decision on this.

How to pay for this brings me to my next point: changing the Recordation Tax for the first time in decades.

I was born and grew up in Columbia in the age of Rouse, and despite his ethos, when we wanted to buy a house not only Columbia, but all of Howard County that was near enough to our workplaces was out of our price range as an EMT and a Crisis Counselor couple. We rented part of a friend's house until an affordable apartment was available. When the market crashed, we could finally afford to buy. It should not take a financial crash to find a home in the place you grew up in. Yet due to the same combination of NIMBYism and McMansion-only development, we are headed to the same state as Palo Alto and the many other Californian cities where a \$100,000 income gets you a spot in a parking lot. As a lifelong Howard County resident who was born here and gave birth to my own children here, I beg you to reconsider. Howard county got on the map as a great place to live because it *wasn't* the east coast Palo Alto. Please don't turn it into that.

A progressive tax that makes less expensive homes less taxed than now and McMansions more taxed does many positive things (beyond funding the above). I saw on Facebook that some of you have expressed concern for those who have lost jobs or hours and thus income, yet when the chance comes to make some difference in some of their lives, passing a change to the recordation tax that will lower the costs for many homeowners to sell their homes, or to refinance, or to take equity out to cover high interest debt that can occur when one runs into desperately needed repairs or medical costs during a pandemic, you balk? Furthermore, the restructured recordation tax would require greater developer investment in our communities while incentivizing them to build fewer McMansions and more homes in the range that Howard County's citizens will be in need of during this likely slow recovery - especially considering that more people are taking in family and friends and apartments don't really let you do that. Even as someone who will probably be paying more with this tax for a house when we eventually up size, as a family that is still employed (if paying for an extra kid in daycare till school starts again), I find myself in favor of greater personal investment in my community beyond short term donations- and unless our home's price goes up radically it's eventual buyer will get not only the amazingly waterproof bathroom I built for kids to splash in, but lower taxes to

have a home of their own. Rejecting the restructuring of the recordation tax would be unacceptably short sighted. As policy makers, it is your job in times of crisis to help the community, especially its more vulnerable members. So many people are doing so much to help their community and neighbors.

Restructuring the recordation tax and moving forward with the New Cultural Center are your opportunity to do so.

Accessible Resource for Independence (ARI) is the federally designated Center for Independent Living (CIL) serving Howard County. We are a disability resource and advocacy organization representing the over 28,000 people with disabilities in the County. While we understand the difficult financial situation that Howard County is facing and understand your Herculean efforts to "make the math work." However, we want to write you to implore you to reconsider cuts to the proposed budget that will have a disparate impact on the disability community.

Funding for the New Cultural Center: Our organization fields hundreds of calls a year from those with disabilities in Howard County seeking accessible, affordable housing. The lack of adequate housing stock that meets these requirements ensures that many people with disabilities end up living on the street, "couch surfing", and often times institutionalized in places like nursing facilities. One of the many ways we hope to combat this issue is to continue to develop housing projects that provide affordable housing. Therefore, we ask for inclusion of funding for the New Cultural Center (NCC) in the FY 2021 Capital Budget. As you are aware, the associated mixed income housing project has been an element of the NCC project since inception of the Downtown Columbia Development Plan. And as you heard during your previous budget work session on this project, the Howard County Housing Commission has secured commitments for \$65 million that will fully finance development of the 174 unit (87 affordable) housing element of the project; that the public/private financing commitment would require no County financial contribution; and that the Housing Commission will be fully responsible for the ongoing operational sustainability of the housing units.

Funding for the Department of Community Resources and Services: The Department of Community Resources has been a reliable partner of ARI's for many years. For example, through the Maryland Access Point (MAP), those who are aging and/or have disabilities are able to reach staff with expertise on aging and disabilities. This service enhances the independence of those in our community who are often disenfranchised and in need of resources and tools to be full contributing members of society. Cuts to this Department could negatively impact services like the MAP and during the recovery from this pandemic, this Department will need adequate staffing and funding to ensure no one gets left behind.

Funding for ADA Ramps Upgrade Program (K5068): It is a tragedy to so many in the disability community that Howard County is considering cutting funds to ensure civil rights for all to use their community effectively.

Ramps allow for those who use mobility devices or even those new parents with strollers to navigate their neighborhood safely. This year marks the 30th Anniversary of the ADA and it is <u>unacceptable</u> this program not be fully funded.

Dear Ms. Jung,

The Hickory Ridge Village Board is disappointed in the proposed amendments that would cut nearly \$4.5 million in funding for key bike and pedestrian projects out of the proposed FY 2021 capital budget. This represents more than half of the funding for active transportation projects including sidewalks, bus stops, crosswalks, paths and more - originally designated for the coming year. In addition, proposed cuts to road resurfacing projects that are critical for bike improvements brings the total number of cuts to our infrastructure to \$9 million. The Hickory Ridge Bike Corridor project is being threatened by these cuts. This project would develop a route for continuous bike lanes and multi-use paths through the village of Hickory Ridge, allowing residents of our village and neighboring areas an easy and safe connection to Downtown Columbia.

The need for improved transportation infrastructure has become even more apparent during the COVID-19 crisis. In the era of physical distancing, many of us are relying on sidewalks, paths and bike lanes for both physical activity and a mental reprieve from isolation. And while some of us have the ability to work from home, many members of our community work at essential businesses and still need to get around as they work to keep our community running as much as possible. These cuts will significant reduce the quality of life for residents in Hickory Ridge and elsewhere in our county, both throughout the duration of the coronavirus crisis and well into the future. As a village and a county, many steps have been taken to improve the health of our community through initiatives and partnerships that will help everyone in the county live a longer and healthier life. The bikeability and cultural amenities of Howard County will help to attract new residents to our county and grow our tax base, particularly in a post-Covid landscape, where preferences in where (and how) people live evolve.

Without this funding, Howard County will not be able to fix our unsafe/deadly intersections, help our kids walk safely to/from school, make it possible for those in wheelchairs to safely get around and create safe bike paths and sidewalks that connect us as a community. For individuals and families in Hickory Ridge these cuts will make it harder and less safe for people to get around on foot, on a bike, in a wheelchair and in a car. We know that these are challenging, unprecedented times, but we should not be cutting the capital budget as a result of this crisis. Instead, we should be investing in small businesses, creating infrastructure jobs, and revitalizing our neighborhoods as part of a strategic effort to avoid and shorten the length of an economic downturn.

These cuts are short-sighted and illogical. We urge the council to reject the proposed amendments.

People come from other states just to see the Broadway-caliber performances in this cramped, out of date facility. It is the ONLY venue like it in the region, and we should be doing everything in our power to showcase it and support the arts that bring thousands of people (and their spending power) to Howard County.

[TL;DR: These budget cuts are penny wise and pound foolish. Do better.]

I am extremely concerned with your amendments and proposed cuts to the FY21 Capital and Operating Budgets.

Investing in our community, helping our seniors, prioritizing education and infrastructure, and committing to public safety, affordable housing and job creation is why I encouraged people to vote for you.

As I've been saying on social media to friends and neighbors, our county must think about our long-term economic recovery. These proposed budget cuts kneecap that long-term recovery, as every reputable economist will tell you.

There are two main points that I want to stress:

- 1. The recordation tax is a restructuring that makes the existing tax *progressive*. It's a tax cut for community members with lower incomes and most of the burden is on homes AND DEVELOPMENTS OVER \$1 million.
- 2. Most of the cuts made especially to the capital budget will simply exacerbate problems and make them all more expensive in a very short time. Dear Councilpersons,

I'll be brief. I am told that there is a vote coming up that will eliminate positions in the Recreation and Parks staff that are earmarked for Therapeutic Recreation. If you don't already know, Howard County's Therapeutic Recreation program is virtually unique in the country, and certainly in the state. It provides many recreational opportunities for individuals with special needs - and it is almost always finding it's offerings full and over-subscribed. Yes, my son is an enthusiastic participant in these programs, and has been for over 15 years.

This pandemic messed us all up. It's impacts will likely be felt well into next year, and beyond. And yes, it may indeed mean that Recreation and Parks Therapeutic Recreation offerings, being social in nature, may be off the table until we can resume close quarter activities. So saving some money now by eliminating positions - seems like it hurts no one. But I believe it does. First, because these programs are indeed oversubscribed, demand far exceeds supply and supply requires vetted and trained staff. These do not grow on trees and in an ideal world, I'd be advocating for more staffing so that the supply can meet demand. But in this pandemic world, that isn't going to happen. But cuts mean that when things resume, staff will be smaller than it would hahve been which simply translates into fewer programs and/or participants. The current problem of the programs being too popular will just get worse, because these vacancies won't have been filled. And likely getting them back once taken off the books s likely iffy as well.

So my request to you is simple. Leave the Therapeutic Recreation budget and staff alone. Why we cannot raise the recordation tax remains a mystery, but in proposing budget cuts, I ask you leave these alone.
