Dear Madam Chair and members of the County Council,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of vital projects within the FY 2021 capital budget. If funded, these projects will benefit our community both now and in the future.

This is a stressful time for all of us — but we are reminded of what we share in common. All of us are deeply concerned for the health and wellbeing of our loved ones and our community. In times like these, we learned that the best way for us to deal with fear and uncertainty is to lean in and take action. There is no time like the present to ensure we are building the active transportation infrastructure needed to make Howard County a more connected place where people can easily and safely walk, bike or access public transportation.

The undersigned members and partners of Streets for All, a coalition of community, business and faith groups that advocate for complete streets in Howard County, are thrilled that County Executive Calvin Ball designated \$7.38 million (not including grants) for projects that will make walking and biking in Howard County better, easier and safer. These projects, outlined in the Office of Transportation's "Complete Streets Policy-Six Month Implementation Update" memorandum, include new and improved bike lanes, street lights, paths, bus stops, sidewalks and pedestrian crossings across Howard County.

With the passage of WalkHoward earlier this year, the proposed budget reflects significant investments in sidewalks, paths and other projects to improve pedestrian safety and connectivity.

The need for a better active transportation infrastructure has become even more apparent during the COVID-19 crisis. In the era of physical distancing, many of us are relying on sidewalks, paths and bike lanes for both physical activity and a mental reprieve from isolation. And while some of us have the ability to work from home, many members of our community work at essential businesses and still need to get around safely and easily as they work to keep our community operating.

The lack of active transportation infrastructure – like sidewalks, bike lanes, crosswalks, paths and bus stops – disproportionately affects communities of color, low-income families, older adults and people with disabilities. Consequently, the lack of connectivity limits their ability to access resources and services to sustain their health and wellbeing at this critical time. Because of these persistent gaps in our active transportation infrastructure, we urge Howard County to identify, study and complete projects with high vulnerable population index (VPI) scores as outlined in CR 120-2019. This will ensure all residents are able to bike, walk, take public transportation and get to where they need to go safely and easily.

We thank County Executive Ball for his leadership and we strongly support these designated investments to make Howard County a more bikeable and walkable community. We urge you to pass this budget that reflects this vision. These investments are critical to ensure our community is a healthy,

safe and connected place for all – now and in the future. We must provide tangible changes that people can see and use, creating healthier communities where all people can thrive, no matter who they are or where they live.

New East Columbia 50+ Center Advisory Committee Testimony 16 April 2020

Good afternoon distinguished Council members.

My name is Nelson Pollack and I currently live at 6252 Golden Coin Ct in District 2 Columbia. I'm testifying this evening on my behalf – and on the behalf all the seniors represented by the New East Columbia 50+ Center Advocacy Committee. We deeply appreciate the \$16.2 million line item in the Executive's FY 2021 budget for the construction of a new Senior 50+ Center facility in East Columbia, under Construction Project CO335-FY2014. We are advocating that, even in the face of today's grim medical and health challenges, the funding be maintained so construction can begin as soon as possible. Delaying this project will only cost the county more money in the future as material costs escalate ... and, given the increasing Howard County senior population, scaling it back now will only cost the county additional money for future needed expansions.

The senior community of Howard County thanks the County Executive and Council for all its efforts making this county a quality place for all residents. We especially want to thank the County for embracing the goal of making Howard County an "AARP Age-Friendly Community to Live" ... a goal that will allow many more of us to age-in-place near our friends and relatives ... and remain a part of the County's tax base.

We are glad that, in line with these and other initiatives, the County has taken steps toward the construction of a new world-class East Columbia 50+ Center. We are grateful that the county has funded the generation of a detailed set of initial architectural design plans. We appreciate the hard work and transparency of the professional staff of the Department of Public Works and the Office of Aging and Independence.

It has been 8 long years since we first became aware of the initial concepts for a new East Columbia 50+ Center. During that time seniors from every one of Howard County's council districts have taken full advantage of the limited three small room capacity of the current facility with our many classes and other activities. We've also frequently testified, met with individual Council members, written letters, sent e-mails, met with your staffs, and generally made our voices politely - but firmly - heard. We also offer you an invitation to visit the present facility. If you do, you'll see that it is not a center- it's a corridor with three rooms.

Many of us are on fixed incomes and we are very aware of Howard County's many fiscal challenges – including those detailed by others at this and other Hearings.

However, enough time has passed. No one in is getting any younger. Now is the time to finish the journey ... Now is the time to drive those shovels into the Earth and turn promises and paper blueprints into the multi-function meeting rooms, lounges, corridors, office spaces, etc., of a world-class, state-of-the art, "jewel in the crown", 50+ Senior facility that all Howard County residents can all be proud of ... and more, importantly, actually enjoy.

Expense Requirements and Fire Station Standards.

Honorable Council Members:

Thank you for requesting my written information after my oral testimony on the Fire Department Capital Budget item.

Request that you deny the Planning Board recommendation for adding to the capital budget a Route 108 fire station. The Planning Board met on Thursday evening, April 9, 2020.

The \$13 million capital budget expense was not properly, nor fully disclosed. National Standards for fire station location were not followed.

A. Required \$13 million project costs and details were not available to the Public.

1. Missing Information and Inadequate Public Notice.

a. **Missing Expense information**. "Greater detail" of the capital project is required to be available to the public. Code § 22.402 and 22.403. Total estimate is \$13 million.

b. Missing Funding information. Current and five year plan not included as required by Code § 22.402 and 22.403

c. Missing Required Notification.

- i. **Meeting time and location** was not posted at the sign at the East Area of Cedar Lane Park. The posted time and place was April 9, 7 PM at the "George Howard Building".
- ii. NO required sign was posted at the location where the displaced ball fields were to be relocated.

iii. Mailings and meetings with the several affected communities did not occur.

- iv. **Planning Board website Information** did not a provide a link to details. Initially it provided a link to a site location off Snowden River Parkway.
- B. Public Input was not considered. Section 22.403(c) requires that public input be considered. At the Planning Board public meeting on April 9 a member of the Planning Board stated, "We are told you cannot take their input. We are told you cannot rely on Community input."
- C. Vital Information was not considered by the Planning Board.

1. **Response Time**. No fire engine response times were provided to the Planning Board.

2. Density. Fire station was needed for "density", but current and forecast density was not provided.

3. **Dense traffic on Route 108.** No study of delayed response times due to Route 108 congestion and limited road shoulders.

D. National Standards for Fire Station Location were not provided.

a. Three National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards contain response time requirements. See: GIS for Fire Station Locations, January 2007. None provided.

- E. Open space/parkland is diminished. No analysis of loss of open space, nor analysis of relocation of soccer fields, and no public input on that subject.
- **F. Planning Board Decision was not "Planning".** Comment after testimony and before deciding was "We are just approving funding. We don't recommend on planning, just on funding." "Our job is to make a recommendation for funding, and priority."
 - a. Definition of "planning". Planning consists of service to the public in an efficient and fair manner, to ensure consistency with the General Plan, and to provide accurate information, creative and effective planning recommendations.

RE: Project T7107 Downtown Columbia Patuxent Branch Trail Extension

Dear Planning Board;

My testimony concerns project T7107. This proposed bike path starts south of downtown Columbia and goes under the Route 29 bridge at the Little Patuxent River. This project has been ongoing for over 6 years. The county has to get the permission from the State of Maryland - State Highway Administration (SHA) to build a path under the Route 29 bridge. After the county submitted several proposals, the State of Maryland has rejected the county's proposal to build a path under the Route 29 bridge near downtown Columbia. The first proposal submitted on August 6 2018, the second proposal submitted on October 16, 2019 and the third proposal submitted on December 5, 2019. On January 3, 2020 SHA rejected the project. I talked to Chris Eatough, the Bicycle and Pedestrian Coordinator in March 2020, who was not aware of the rejection. Obviously he is not reviewing the contractor's work. The contractor is not keeping Chris informed of this rejection. The contractor continues to work on this project which cannot be done because the MD SHA will not give them permission to build over their land.

The SHA's reasoning is A. They are concerned with the Extreme flash flooding under the Route 29 bridge; and B. There is already a safe path 3/8 of a mile away via the Route 29 bridge path over Route 29.

The rejection of the bike path by the State of Maryland can be verified by going to the website https://www.roads.maryland.gov/mdotsha/pages/amd.aspx?Pageid=876 and typing in project 18APHO008XX. At that time they called it the Stevens Forrest shared use path. Howard County keeps changing the name of the project even though it is the same project to confuse people and disguise its failure. Eric Tissue from SHA, the engineer who worked on this project can verify that this path has been rejected. Eric's email is Tissue.consultant@mdot.maryland.gov or Telephone 301-624-8153. Also, Scott Newill the supervisor at SHA can verify this rejection snewill@sha.state.md.us 301-624-8151.

Also, there is incorrect information in the description stating that it is a car free connection between downtown Columbia and Savage. At Vollmerhausen Road near the Patuxent Valley Middle School the path crosses the road and go up a very steep hill. Crossing the road is dangerous because of the curve at the top of the hill with limited visibility. Also, once one crosses the road they would have to share a small sidewalk with school walkers and ride up a very steep hill. This can be viewed on goggle maps where the Patuxent Branch Trail is shown but is deceiving as the steep hill is not shown but the curve in the road is shown

Below is a picture of a flood under the Route 29 bridge where the path would be built.

On May 27, 2018 fireman performed a high water rescue of a woman on Route 29 near the bridge where the path would be built under the bridge. See video below. https://patch.com/maryland/columbia/high-water-closes-part-highway-columbia

County officials say flooding is rare which is not true. Since the river bank is only a few feet above the water level under the Route 29 bridge it floods with as little as 1/2 " of rain.

Over \$575,000 has been appropriated on this path which had very little chance of getting approved from the beginning. This has been a complete waste of money. The bike committee which is composed of extreme fanatical bikers will never cancel this project even though the

State of Maryland rejected the county's proposal. There is no need to continue to waste money on this proposed path when there are many bike paths that can be built that are safe and feasible. Please remove this project from the 2021 budget.

Dear County Council,

After reviewing the SAAC department presentations, the proposed Capital Budget, and in light of the budgetary uncertainty due to the current Covid-19 pandemic, I would like to offer the following comments.

Please consider limiting capital projects to areas of need in the county. Needs might include long-awaited road repairs, stormwater management concerns, and ongoing repairs to maintain facilities, parks, etc. Many departments have mentioned ongoing deferred maintenance problems. While many projects mentioned in the capital budget are visionary, if they do not "pay for themselves" in some way (and add ongoing maintenance costs), they should be scrutinized carefully.

Please consider delaying projects that are not mission critical to the county and that have not already begun. Items such as parking structures, new office facilities, new work/training spaces, etc. may be able to be delayed under the current county circumstances.

There are two areas I think should be considered essential because their use is mandated. People are required by law to be in K-12 schools and the detention center. These are places we must maintain adequately. Howard County residents have the freedom to come and go to the various libraries, community centers, pools, and parks. Community schools and the detention center are places residents must attend and therefore they must be maintained adequately for the population. They are not fun, but they are our obligation.

Other areas, including pools, parks, arts centers, and senior centers are amenities. Surely there must be outside grants and/or businesses that would be interested in partnering with Howard County for these projects. Please note that some projects are requesting the highest quality materials and gold star LEED certification. Is this the most efficient and effective use of county funds? I have heard suggestions that we look for public-private partnerships for our schools -- why not for senior centers? At the very least, please consider financially partnering with CA in building projects within Columbia. I assume that it is their mission to maintain and develop the amenities in this area and would therefore be interested in investing in projects such as new fields, senior centers, etc. within Columbia proper.

I wanted to comment on the Cultural Arts Center. Similar and nearby art and performance space is available at HCC and Wilde Lake HS, both of which are already paid for and maintained. Perhaps these spaces could be utilized more fully with better transportation rather than \$60,000,000 in building costs?

Finally, all amenities constructed should strive to be revenue neutral. Fees should be charged to businesses and individuals using these facilities that will ensure that their ongoing maintenance can be managed. We must request that departments generate revenue through a combination of fees, grants, and business partnerships to meet their ongoing needs.

(First, please presume that this testimony was prepared before the current Coronavirus crisis.)

As an advocate of mixed income housing in Downtown Columbia, I ask this council to support the development of the Cultural Center, one of five projects promised in the 2010 DRRA between the county and the Howard Hughes Corp. to fulfill the need for affordable housing in Downtown.

Those of us who advocated for a simpler inclusionary approach to supply mixed income housing throughout Downtown, were assured that the developments to be built on county owned land would deliver affordable housing faster. However, as thousands of apartments go up in Downtown, ground has not yet been broken on any of these sites. Approving the Cultural Center will finally bring our first mixed income development to fruition.

Through the tedious efforts of the Housing Commission, the Downtown Columbia Housing Commission, the county government and the Orensteins, funding has been secured that will not use general fund money or add to the deficit. I realize this is a hard concept for the public to comprehend and I know there is considerable public resistance. I have not been able to follow all of the changes for the budget hearing and testimony times. Hence, the Email. I do know that I was "not" informed when the Army Corp of Engineers came back to Howard County with their report that Senator Cardin ordered after the state storm water management hearing that was held after the second massive flood, and I missed that important meeting. There were many questions that needed to be raised about the outlying areas of the watershed, besides Historic Ellicott City. (Why is there not a comprehensive calendar that lists all of the county events, and that is sent to the people that signed up for county notifications? IE The Charter public hearings were not even on the county calendar, if you were able to even find it).

There are other areas besides Historic Ellicott City that are in the two watersheds that are in dire need of storm water management. Dunloggin is a 60 year old neighborhood and our concerns are only addressed when the roads actually cave in due to outdated storm water management. I would like to request budget monies for fixing our ailing storm water management issues in the two watersheds, outside of the Historic Ellicott City project.

I am still waiting on word about a berm on Saint John's Lane to keep the water that rushes off of the road down through my, and my neighbor's yards (that never did this until the level of the road was raised after so many repavings without digging the road back down to its original height, as should have been done.)

The last time anything was done was when the county covered their own backsides by saying that they were no longer responsible for private systems that hook to county systems, even though the county mandated these systems. That is unfair to make our properties illegal after the county forced the same property owners to install storm water management that hooked directly to county drainage systems in the first place. The county was aware of these water issues 50-60 years ago. (Actually, what are county systems for, if the citizens cannot access them?) These older neighborhoods need comprehensive storm water management, now. I used to have a yard when I moved in more than twenty years ago. Now I have a constant swamp. Tax dollars have been paid for infrastructure, yet the storm water management has been woefully ignored.

Yes, we have our hands full right now, but the county has had fifty years to save for this rainy day!

Dear County Executive Ball,

The River Hill Community Association appreciates the opportunity to provide input on the County's FY21 Budget. Howard County is an excellent place to live, work, and play and the Board supports efforts to maintain the quality of life in the County. The issues currently of greatest importance to our community are education and safety.

Howard County's educational system is a strong one and is vital to maintain the quality of life for residents and property values across the county. While we are grateful for the proposed budget that increased in educational spending, more is needed to be done to accurately allocate and fund our county's school system.

Our excellent public education has been a crucial component in the growth and prosperity shared by all in Howard County. The Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) and its educators have consistently been recognized for their achievements at the national level. On the heel of the largest redistricting initiative in Howard's history, our community agrees with you that "... It is now time for us to begin the healing process and start coming together as a county...we continue to share a common goal - to provide all our students the best public education possible and foster the best teaching environment for our educators."

We believe that adequately funding our schools sends the important message to the citizens of Howard County and HCPSS educators that, the county is fully supportive of the school system and the decision of the Board of Education (BOE). Our community also shares your concern with the BOE's inability to clarify the data provided by HCPSS.

Therefore, we recommend the county request a performance audit by the Maryland State Department of Education to fully understand the expenditures of HCPSS, the redistricting process, and the effectiveness of the recent redistricting in addressing the student achievement gaps in our county. An objective third party, post implementation review of the redistricting plan will also provide insight for future redistricting; clarity in the process and the data for redistricting will help our citizens and decision-makers continue

our tradition of providing the best education for our children; and an accurate understanding of expenditures that will help citizens appreciate the depth and complexity of what make HCPSS great.

The River Hill Community Association maintains a strong focus on general safety within the community, traffic and pedestrian safety issues, and improvements along the MD 108 corridor. The following are budget priorities for our community:

- Public Safety The association supports the work that the County's Fire and Rescue and Police Departments perform to keep our communities safe. These departments must be adequately funded to maintain services as the County's population grows, attrition of employees occurs, and community needs change. Adequate funding is crucial to attracting and hiring fire fighters and officers without having to sacrifice hiring standards. While we are disappointed that due to budget constraints construction of a third police station has been postponed, we fully support projects to renovate and repurpose space for the department's short-term use. However, we ask that your administration continue to plan for construction of a new station, establish a new funding schedule, and identify an alternative location if necessary.
- Infrastructure Improvements and Connectivity Improvements are needed along the MD 108 commercial corridor in Clarksville to improve bike and pedestrian connectivity, reduce traffic congestion and speeding, improve safety, and create a sense of place. Therefore, the association continues to support Capital Project T7108 Clarksville-River Hill Streetscape Improvements. The 65% design needs to be completed in FY21 and adequate funding established for construction in FY22 and FY23. We expect the county to collaborate with the State Highway Administration and developers along the corridor to maximize their contributions to this effort.
- Road Resurfacing The association also supports funds for the Road Resurfacing Program. We ask that resurfacing funds in FY21 be allocated to include the completion of the project that began in the Pointers Run neighborhood in FY20. In 2019, bike lanes were installed along Summer Sunrise Drive, in conjunction with a re-surfacing project. Although roadway markings indicating the work would include the section of the neighborhood off Empty Song Road and connecting to Grace Drive, resurfacing in this area did not occur. This happened even though the streets in part of the neighborhood pre-date those at the rear off River Run which were re-surfaced.
- Street Trees Street trees are a signature element of Columbia's villages. As the county ages, adequate funds are needed for street tree replacement and maintenance. The County's trim cycle of 12 13 years is inadequate in addressing the growth of the street trees in the River Hill community. The result is a lack of visibility, traffic safety issues, difficulty for pedestrians

using the sidewalks, and general resident frustration. In River Hill we have had some residents take "matters into their own hands" by pruning the street trees in a manner that damages the trees. While we recognize and appreciate that much of the budget has been directed to the removal of trees affected by the Emerald Ash Borer, funding needs to be enhanced for general street tree maintenance. The current trim cycle is too long in younger communities where trees are not as tall as in some of the older residential sections of the county.

 Sidewalk Repairs – The association supports funding for sidewalk repairs to address deteriorated sidewalks and driveway aprons in the public rights-ofway. Our community is now more than 25 years old and we are seeing the impact that time and tree roots have on the condition of our neighborhood sidewalks.

Thank you for considering our community's priorities and needs as you move forward in the budget process.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ENHANCEMENT TO OOAI AGING IN PLACE RESOURCES

I am pleased that the Housing Opportunity Master Plan is underway. It is especially important that the County closely examine the housing needs of our Senior residents-myself included. The Howard County Senior Housing Master Plan has not been updated since 2004.

While we await and some of us actively participate in a future -focused plan, it's arguably more important that you put some dedicated resources into helping seniors now.

The 2004 Report had this short term recommendation (one to two years -or 2006!):

"Expanding the Office on Aging's capacity to provide consultation and guidance to senior homeowners, assisting them to identify the needed scope of work, determine appropriate contractors or other sources, and contract for home repair, maintenance, renovation or modification. Seek partnerships with community and volunteer organizations to provide this help."

It's now time to fully implement this recommendation:

"The OOAI should "staff up" or repurpose its existing staff to lead an aggressive and proactive Aging in Place program in partnership with other County departments and the private sector. The increased resources should be equal to the \$400 000 provided for the Housing Opportunities contract.

The County should provide a free "Age Friendly Home" evaluation for our 60+population so they will know the "ins and outs" of continuing to live where they are and can make house modifications for long term care at home or develop other housing options. This could start with seniors who have qualified for the Income based Senior Tax Credit or the Aging in Place Property Tax Credit. The next logical step is to help make sure these homes are "Age - Friendly".

This assessment should include:

- **Home Safety.** A Home Safety or Home Risk Assessment should be done as a baseline to assure that homes are as safe as possible for daily living.
- An Aging in Place (Stay or Go Move) Assessment. The County should provide a list of options, questions and pros and cons of staying in the current residence versus moving.
- Universal Design /Visitability Assessment. This should be based on the Universal Design Guidelines for Age Restricted Adult Housing in Howard County. (The current requirements should also be evaluated and probably enhanced.)

- Technology Assessment and Assistance. Affordable internet and WIFI access county wide will foster communications and services. Technology will help provide for long term care at home and lessen the burden on family caregivers. It will also enhance job growth in both the home care and technology service sectors.
- Energy Efficiency Assessments and Assistance. Many homes occupied by seniors are decades old and energy inefficient and unhealthy –e.g., mold in the HVAC units and clogged ducts. This not only drives up utility costs but has adverse health consequences as seniors keep home temperatures abnormally high or low.

This funding request is a miniscule investment when compared with the return it could provide to maintain the safety, health and well-being of our older adults. It will also reduce the burden on caregivers, other County services and health providers. Further, this "all inclusive" approach would establish the County as a leading Age Friendly County.

I appreciate the opportunity to participate in the budget determination process.

Dear Dr. Ball and Members of the Howard County Council,

My name is Roger Thibaudeau. I am a long-time volunteer for the Howard County Autism Society (HCAS), currently serve as the Chair of the Education Advocacy Committee, and have a 16-year old son with autism. I am providing this testimony today to cover two individual budget related topics;

- 1. Grants to non-profit organizations in support of the community
- 2. The Special Education portion of the HCPSS budget request

Firstly, on behalf of the Howard County Autism Society, I would like to thank you for your support of our organization and our members. The County has consistently provided us with funding opportunities so that we can develop innovative and effective supports for those on the autism spectrum, their families, and the communities in which they live and work. A prime example of this support was just last week, as the County honored us with a \$10,000 Innovation Grant to stand up an Autism Hiring Center designed to create a comprehensive program to develop a workforce pipeline across the county with our local businesses. We are excited for this opportunity given the extremely high rates of unemployment among those on the spectrum throughout the county, state and country.

At HCAS, we have also been fortunate to be consistent recipients of funding from the County through the Community Service Partnership Grant Program. HCAS relies on this funding stream to bring several key programs to the community, including:

- Support of a navigator for families facing significant additional challenges,
- Upkeep of our unique special education news center,

Howard County Autism Society

- Support of many education-related conferences and meetings,
- Continued partnership with Disability Rights Maryland, and
- One-on-one support services we offer the community through our educational consultant. Through the multitude of feedback we receive, we know these services are making a significant impact in the lives of those families we are serving. We are hopeful that this year's budget includes the funding that will allow us to continue supporting these programs into FY21 without having to reduce our services to the community.

Switching gears, we would like to talk about an area where we believe the funding needs are not being met. Specifically, we would like to discuss the special education crisis we are facing in the Howard County Public School System (HCPSS) due to a crippling combination of lack of staffing, and lack of training.

As the student population grows, so too does the number of special education students being supported by HCPSS. However, the percentage growth is higher amongst the special education population, a trend that has continued from recent years. Along with growth in numbers, we have also seen a rise in the complexity and diversity of needs of students across the county. When you add to that the questionable budget and programming decisions made by the last school administration that eroded the supports offered to some of our most vulnerable children, it should come as no surprise to anyone that the gap between available resources, and required resources, is so large. If we do not adequately staff special education, everyone loses; teachers burn out and leave, morale plummets, and our children fail.

For the second year in a row, Dr. Martirano, Dr. Savage and the HCPSS Department of Special Education (DSE) team have put forth a budget aimed at attempting to fill the resource gap. Yet, for the second year in a row, the Board of Education (BOE) has voted to significantly cut the additional requested staff before sending the budget onto the County.

Last year's BOE cut from the requested DSE budget was over \$5M. And since then;

- We have seen a continued rise in the diversity of needs, the complexity of challenges, and the sheer number of students requiring supports.
- We have heard from a multitude of parents and teachers concerned about the understaffed and undertrained classrooms supporting their students.
- We witnessed four brave special education staff members testify in front of the BOE in November about the dire nature of the barriers impeding them from providing the services to our children that these teachers yearn to provide.
- We saw a special education department so diluted that the HCEA felt the need to file a class action grievance on behalf of more than 70 of those teachers focusing on the severe effects of the underfunding on the staff, and on our children.

This year, the BOE cut \$4.2M from the Dr. Martirano's FY21 DSE budget, including half of the requested 216 additional staffing positions. Given the feedback from students, teachers, staff and parents alike, some may wonder why they made those cuts. We believe they know the additional staff is needed, but they believe that, given the County budget forecast, the HCPSS budget sent forth, even with the cuts made, is untenable; that the County does not have the

revenue to cover the amount Dr. Martirano requested; and that the percentage of the school expenses of the overall County budget is growing too rapidly and too large.

I am not here to argue those points. I'll leave that to those much more versed in County funding and politics than I am. We often talk about affordability when it comes to the County budget. I know that the budgeting task that lies ahead of you is challenging. But one thing should be clear. What we <u>cannot</u> afford are additional cuts to the special education budget put forth. We cannot continue to mortgage our future to handle the present. What happens when our students cannot grow and succeed due to lack of resources? They eventually age out of the school system. Once that happens, they struggle to find jobs, become isolated from the community, and require greater support for the remainder of their lives; well beyond the 15-18 years they are supported in school. Penny-wise and pound-foolish is an old, but perfect, analogy to describe this situation.

If there have to be additional cuts to the school budget, we must ensure they do not come on the backs of our most vulnerable students. The funding increase for special education remaining in the Board of Education budget can still provide positive impact for our community, as it provides for over 100 additional staff, including 20 K-12 special education teachers and 48 positions in early intervention. This augmented spending is a first step to work toward ensuring that our children will be safe every day they go to school, and will all have a true opportunity for quality education and an independent life. We have a long way to go to adequately support special education students in our County. We implore you to preserve this increase, and resist the urge to balance the budget at the expense of the most vulnerable in our school system.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony. We look forward to our continued partnership with the county.

Dear County Executive Ball and Council Member Jung,

In reviewing the budget presentations for FY2021, I would like to offer the following areas of consideration:

Capital Budget

Flood mitigation, street maintenance, detention center repairs, and school expansion seem to be areas of need in the county. Expanded sports fields, new libraries, senior centers, wedding venues, swimming pools, more sports fields, and expanded parks seem to be wants. Please limit these amenity projects. Every department mentioned the need to address maintenance backlog. This should be the priority over adding more facilities, employees, and land to maintain.

Operating Budget:

The Library System received 2.5% of the budget last year. In Montgomery County, Community Use of Facilities, Recreation and Libraries only accounted for 1.7% of their Operating Budget.

The Office of Transportation RTA stated that ridership is falling, but they added 5,000 hours of service and need new busses. Before more money is deployed, perhaps needs should be analyzed. Before bus stops are reconfigured and new bus shelters are put in place, perhaps the usage of stops should be more carefully evaluated. Maybe our new scooter partners have some suggestions on meeting county user demands and incentivizing use.

The Police Department requests increase staff due to school events. I believe that in the school budget sessions, HCPSS stated that they would be trying to handle more events with their own safety staff. Please determine which will be the case before allocating funding. There was also was a request for more officers. While the department feels stretched thin based on population growth, the actual crime numbers continue to decrease in every category except vehicle theft. The third area of concern was the challenges of Special Event Staffing. This type of staffing should not be allowed to put a strain on the budgets of our local agencies. If special events require a certain amount of police presence, that should be figured into the cost of permitting the event and payments should be made by the organizers, private or public.

The school system maintains fields and buildings for community use. They pay for the staff and maintenance out of the school budget. They run the bussing program for several private schools. They provide space for teacher daycare centers. The police department staffs special events out of their budget. Departments should not be overburdened while answering to the needs of other departments or organizations. Perhaps money should be allocated to

departments to "pay" other departments for their services. It may encourage departments to be more strategic in their planning and requests if they see the budgetary impact.

Special activities, programming, and services should strive to be more revenue neutral. If we are not charging enough for permits, school/field use, library classes, summer school, senior center use, transportation, etc., then the pricing model needs to be reviewed. Perhaps a sliding payment scale would provide more equity.

Revenues

As our land inventory reaches capacity, we face a tighter budget. This problem is exacerbated by allowing growth where infrastructure is not available. The fiscal study presented to SAAC assumes school capacity exists. In areas where there is no such school capacity, development causes more problems. Development should be directed to areas where capacity is available.

While our business sector is growing (at 18%) we are still far behind our neighbors (Montgomery and Frederick are about 22-24% business). Housing development should not be considered synonymous with business. We must focus on other types of business to develop long-term stability as we move out of the "growth" phase of the county.

Population growth

SAAC presented that we have a growing senior population. While this is true, we were starting at a lower than average number of seniors. Meanwhile, the population of children in Howard County is still more than 11% higher than other counties in Maryland and is the fastest growing student population in the State of Maryland. This should be considered when allocating funds and services.

Due to the fluid situation with the COVID-19 virus, I appreciate the opportunity to submit written testimony rather than appear in person at the Budget Hearing Thursday night as originally planned. I am following CDC guidelines and, as I am over 70, the advise is to avoid large crowds.

As everyone is well aware, there is a stormwater run-off drainage issue that effects my backyard at 6069 Watch Chain Way in Columbia, as well as my neighbor Birchard Allen at 6065 Watch Chain Way and John Cataldi at 6105 Stem Winder Court

The stormwater run-off has continued to increase over the past twenty years and reached a point last spring when we notified everyone the saturation was just intolerable. In my opinion, there are economic, health and safety issues.

My neighbors and I have worked for over a year in good faith with HoCo DPW to try to obtain funding for an

independent study of the sewer system in our area to determine the source of the increased run-off as well as what is recommended, based on the facts, to mitigate and/or reduce the surface water which ends up sitting in our three yards. We have no idea if there is capacity in the sewer system that could be utilized with some cost effective modifications or if new sewer drain construction are needed. (that is most likely the case for the standing water in the easement on Lot 270 owned by Parks and Rec). They recently declined to take any action and they told us we were on our own.

With the help of Kimberly Pruim, Sameer Sidh of Calvin Ball's office and Deb Jung's office, we have been informed that DPW will now arrange for an independent third party assessment of the storm water run-off that effects us. Although we have not received anything in writing to confirm the initiative, we have seen at least one potential candidate visit our area to personally survey the situation. Nevertheless, we believe that written confirmations not too much to ask of DPW.

We hope this is a story with a happy ending and an example of government in action for the common good because as we know, "all politics are local".

We hope that perhaps DPW could be more transparent and share the timeline and scope of the study. We are not engineers and are not trying to interfere with their business. We are not trying to capitalize on this situation, only to maximize the effectiveness by developing a good rapport with all involved.

There are still miles to go regarding this chronic problem. Once we have the benefit of the information contained in the study, we can then determine the appropriate course of action to follow. We are fair people and if things need to be done by DPW, we expect not to have to continue the endless delays and lack of answers and "there is no money in the budget" that we have continually received from them. If there are components for appropriate action by the homeowners, we will accept that.

We look forward to working with everyone effectively for the common good.

Dear Calvin,

As you put together both the operating and capital budgets in the area I would like to bring up an area that definitely needs more funding. Transportation is a crucial element in the lives of EVERYONE in the county, and I have been planning for some time to bring to your attention a serious shortcoming that affects practically every mode of transportation our citizens use, be it bikes, buses, or private autos. In short, our local roads are in dreadful condition.

I see more potholes in the roads today than I can ever remember in the 52 years I have lived in Howard County. Our hard-working public works crews repair the potholes, but more crop up right near the ones just repaired. As I drive down neighborhood roads, even where there are no potholes there are significant cracks running through the roads, a signal that potholes are likely to appear soon. Many of our roads need resurfacing, not just pothole repair, and yet I see little or no money in the budget to resurface our local roads. I am enclosing pictures I took on Dunloggin Road and MacAlpine Road, within a block of my home, but I assure you that we are not unusual. I am confident that most of the neighborhoods have similar conditions.

Roads like this are unsightly and embarrass me when I have friends come visit me in what I brag is a great place to live, but it is also unsafe in bad weather, causes wear on tires, and can make for especially uncomfortable rides for frail or handicapped passengers and drivers.

I appreciate initiatives to improve our transportation network, but basic local government services like road maintenance are prerequisite to successful operation of those new initiatives as well as to serving the many citizens in communities like mine (or yours) that are not dense enough for significant mass transit or for cycling and walking to serve most of our needs.

Planning for future improvements is great and is necessary, but we need to put the priority on taking care
of what we already have. Please help by putting more of my tax dollars to keeping the roads I use every
day in better repair.





I am sending this email as a substitute for giving in person testimony. I think it's wonderful that the county executive and council are inviting citizens input on budget priorities. There are several issues impacting my neighborhood and the county in general. I will list them here:

- School improvements Please put Dunloggin Middle School back on track for renovations
- Complete streets traffic safety I support complete streets AND want to be sure bike riders and pedestrians are safe in my neighborhood (Dorsey's Search/Dorsey Hall) Car traffic at 108/Columbia Rd and Columbia Rd/Old Annapolis Rds intersections is dangerous here at peak times. I have learned that the county is aware that the back ups here are due to drivers using Columbia Rd and Old Annapolis to avoid back ups on Rt 40 and 70. So 1) Please work with the state of MD to alleviate traffic here so that bike riders and pedestrians can safely get to shopping, school and work places at peak times. 2) Please ENHANCE the turning lane signage and markings on southbound Columbia Rd where it crosses 108. There are often near misses between cars themselves where motorists overlook that the left lane is left turn only. What will happen to bike riders? It is downright dangerous at peak times 3) Please improve crosswalk visibility on 108 and I strongly urge bike lanes and sidewalks on 108 (unless the MD state doesn't allow that?) 4) Please figure out what can be done to alleviate traffic at Columbia Rd/Old Annapolis intersection. That's a tight section of road 5) This is not a direct budget item but could end up saving the county money so I will include it here: please, please reconsider if Old Route 108 could be used to increase bike/pedestrian/car safety instead of selling it to a private developer. My neighbors and I are sincerely concerned about these two intersections and would like to see the county working on solutions. Thank you!
- Storm water management: there's a lot of run off in Howard County. I see quite a lot of run off on parking lots and roadways. We're not going to be reaching the Chesapeake Bay goals at this rate. Please allocate funds for storm water management. Something that would be a fantastic fix and has worked in other parts of Maryland is doing Green Streets. These are like complete streets but with storm water management designed in as well through the installation of trees, drought/flood tolerating native plants and rain garden features where appropriate. So how about adding in a green layer to all the county's complete street plans? Might as well knock this out while you are installing complete streets. That would save money and continue allowing the county to respond to climate change.
- Recycling: please come up with a solution that will allow the county to accept more types of plastic for recycling and perhaps get food digesters to be able to put food waste to good use

The mission of the Mediation and Conflict Resolution Center (MCRC) is to provide widely accessible and affordable conflict resolution services and education that help all members of the community manage difficult conversations in a meaningful, proactive way. In FY21 MCRC has been provided the opportunity to renew its CSP grant, which will take this young nonprofit into its 4th year. Vital county support received since the rebirth of this organization in March 2017 has been greatly appreciated.

In each of those years MCRC has provided over 100 conflict resolution services in the form of community, prisoner re-entry and family mediations, youth restorative practices and school circles - services that assist people in having difficult conversations and work towards solutions that help them move forward from their current challenges. We are excited to soon be expanding our services to our Howard County senior citizens. We will be offering assistance to staff in senior living facilities, facilitating conversations with and among seniors who are closed in, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, and mediation service with families and their seniors looking to plan and make important decisions for the safety and well-being of their loved ones.

Yet MCRC does not want to only be known as the center that helps resolve conflict. Practicing effective conflict management is a critical piece in supporting a civil society. MCRC promotes the development of strong conflict management skills in its presentations, workshops and group facilitations which have been delivered to community groups, churches, nonprofit organizations, businesses, the public library and school systems, police and fire departments and the Office of Workforce Development.

In FY21, MCRC will maintain attention on conflict resolution services while also dedicating certain MCRC messaging to effective communication and conflict management skills development to support individual and organizational wellness. To that end, MCRC was excited to host a summer internship program to select high school students and young adults that would focus on contributing to a marketing strategy to educate young people about the benefits of effective conflict management strategies and attract more young involvement with MCRC. The end product of the internship was to be a marketing plan that will be presented to MCRC's Outreach Committee and incorporated into MCRC's print and electronic outreach materials. Although this project is now on hold due to the current pandemic, we do still expect to see this opportunity through at a later date.

So, you see, the Mediation and Conflict Resolution Center seeks to engage all residents of Howard County. Amazingly, all of MCRC's great work is being completed by 2 full-

time staff and a roster of 40 dedicated, highly trained volunteers. Due to a reduction of CSP funding last year, MCRC found it necessary to reduce its staff from 2.5 FTE to 2. a 20% decrease. Strict fiscal responsibility together with dedicated human resources and focused steps towards smart, sustainable funding diversity has allowed the organization to march on. Case by case, workshop by workshop, conversation by conversation, MCRC is making a difference in how the people of Howard County respond to conflict. But there is a lot more work to be done and more resources are needed. MCRC wants to be recognized as the Howard County 'go to' resource to help each person, family, or group find the outcome that best fits them, regardless of their financial resources. While we offer our services at low or no cost, that does not mean that the services have no cost associated. We have been agile during this difficult period and continued to offer some of our services virtually particularly those services provided to youth in trouble in our County. MCRC is open and responding virtually and by phone to individuals and families who are experiencing conflict, some due to the COVID-19 virus restrictions with parents working from home, college students home early with no possibilities for summer jobs, the inability of our seniors to see and visit with families and the lack of the ability to socialize in person. WE DO GREAT WORK. WE PROVIDE CONSISTENT, SKILLED SUPPORT THROUGHOUT THE COMMUNITY. WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE. WE ARE A VALUABLE COMMUNITY RESOURCE AND LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUING TO HELP THE COUNTY COUNCIL MEMBERS' CONSTITUENCIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY.

Renewal of CSP funding at the FY20 level (\$100,000) will support <u>basic</u> operational costs and would allow MCRC to continue to provide exceptional services and increase its visibility and influence throughout the county at a time when this is even more critical.

Thank you for your consideration and for the opportunity to continue to serve the people of Howard County.

For this program to effectively function, it is critical that it be funded in regular, predictable increments. Because no funds were added to the Fund this year, our recommendation for the upcoming fiscal year: \$1.5 million. This will ensure the County can hire staff to work with the Commission as well as ensure the program is fully funded ahead of the elections in 2022.

Please note that if adequate funds are not available, the Director will have to mandate a pro rata reduction in the amounts that will be matched. Such a reduction would jeopardize public trust in the program, the willingness of candidates to seek public funding, and the reputation of the Citizens' Election Fund itself.

^{*}Assumption continues to be that 2/3 of Council expenses occur in the primary and 1/3 occur in the general, while County Executive race costs are 50/50.

Public Comment Common Cause Maryland County Council Operating Budget Work Session

Dear Howard County Council

This comment is in regard to the Fiscal Year 2021 Operating Budget, in which, County Executive Ball allocated \$750,000 in funding to be made available to establish the Citizen's Election Fund. We are very pleased that the County Executive has recognized the importance of funding this program, even in the midst of COVID-19 and the impact of COVID-19 on the County's Budget. That being stated, we are still concerned that the program is in danger of not being ready for use by the 2022 election.

As a refresher, the Citizens Election Fund is a campaign finance reform established in Howard County in 2016. As the County Executive described in the budget, the Citizen Election Fund provides matching funds to small donations from ordinary people. The purpose of the fund is to promote and encourage broader access to elected office in Howard County and help prevent large donations from having undue influence in government.

Our recommendation has always been for \$750,000 of the budget to be allocated for the fund every year. This consistent allocation of resources results in the program having at least \$3 million in the fund every four years, in time to properly fund each county election. This amount allows participating candidates for County Executive and County Council to run competitive campaigns in their elections. Although \$750,000 has been allocated to the fund in the 2021 operating budget, last year money was not allocated to fund the program. As of now, it appears the program is not on track to be adequately funded for the 2022 election.

We understand that adequately funding the Citizen's Election Fund at this time will be very difficult. Under normal circumstances, we would strongly recommend that \$1.5 million be allocated to fund the program this year. However, under the current circumstances, we simply ask that a plan be put in place to ensure the program is adequately funded by the 2022 election. Again, we applaud both the County Executive and the County Council for all your hard work and the leadership you have shown during this time.

Dear County Council,

It is difficult for a regular citizen to offer substantive feedback on the operating budget. In an effort to understand our spending, I have attached a comparison of Montgomery, Frederick, and Howard counties.

I offer it only to get a sense of where we are spending and how it compares to our neighbors. Please note that Montgomery County does not segment out Public Works from their government, so that figure is not reliable (better to group all of general government together). Some items were segmented out in the other budgets (such as Emergency Response) but not in Howard County, so I assume they are folded into other categories. All budgets compared are the 2021 proposed operating budgets. I hesitate to send it along with Dr. Jones on the board, as I am no mathematician or true budget analyst. I hope he will go easy on me. This is offered as a conversation starter, not a true statistical analysis.

Even with these deficiencies, there are some clear discrepancies. Please note that we spend 10% less on the operations of our public schools than either other county as a percentage of budget. The community college is also an area that receives less operational funding than either other county. As a county, our operating budget reflects our needs and priorities. Please consider taking a close look at where we spend our funds.

Housing Market Update April 24, 2020

Howard County Market Conditions (March 2020)

- March 2020 began strong, outpacing 2019 numbers in transaction volume. With the imposition of stayat-home orders and social distancing, the second half of the month under-performed 2019 in volume.
- New listings declined 9% and new pending sales decreased 10% from March 2019 levels. (Source: Bright MLS)
- Housing prices remained steady from February, and were up 9% from last year. Overall housing inventory remains low, which helps to support housing prices. (Source: Bright MLS, Freddie Mac)

Regional and National Market Outlook

- Real estate transactions are continuing through the use of technology and assistance from state and federal regulators.
- Bright MLS, which includes Howard and other counties throughout the greater D.C and Baltimore areas, are releasing weekly snapshots of monthly activity to-date. For the current week, pending home sales volume is down 45% compared to 2019.
- An April 2020 National Association of REALTORS® (NAR) Economic Pulse survey of membership revealed that 57% of buyers and 59% of sellers are planning to delay their real estate transactions for at least a few months. 10% of buyers and 10% of sellers anticipate delaying their purchases indefinitely.
- The NAR Weekly Housing Market Monitor report for the current week found that 131,000 Maryland homeowners and 51,000 renters are struggling to afford their monthly payments.
- Freddie Mac's latest quarterly forecast predicts a similar 45% decline in sales volume nationwide throughout the 2nd Quarter. Beyond that, current predictions show a slow increase in the number of sales over Q3 and Q4 of 2020 and Q1 of 2021, returning to previous volumes by 2Q of 2021.

Additional Considerations

The above projections are based upon what is known about the economy and the state of emergency at this time. The following factors can influence these projections upward or downward:

Continued Mortgage Liquidity – Many lenders have been increasing requirements for prospective buyers by requiring higher credit scores and increased down payments. There are estimates that between 4-6% of the buyers who received mortgage loans in February would not have qualified for those same loans today. Federal assistance may be needed in this area to keep mortgage capital available for those who need it.

Overall Economic Conditions – Unemployment insurance claims have been higher than expected, and even those remaining employed have experienced decreases in income. One-third of renters and 3 million homeowners did not make their scheduled rent or mortgage payments for April.

<u>Pandemic Response</u> – Many projections are based upon a limited continuation of social distancing and some return to normal business activity by the summer. Should another period of pandemic response remain necessary, it will have impacts on the housing market and broader economy. Timing of economic opening may also impact buyer or seller behavior as it relates to lease renewal terms for those currently renting, the start of the 2021-22 school year, or other factors.

Council Members;

Responding to the question raised at the last County Council work session, below is a starting list for funding sources for a fire station. Thanks for asking.

Favorable consideration will be given to applications which provide answers to planning questions, including compliance with National Fire Station Location standards, response times, and how does spending \$13 million on a relatively small 3 bay fire station fit into the currently underway 20 year county General Plan. Three National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards contain response time requirements, and response time maps. Planning would also include details on existing density, currently approved plans adding density, zoning that permits "density" increases in specific areas, and associated traffic/road capacity/travel times.

Funding is available for fire stations. Governor Hogan's office provides assistance. Numerous federal agencies and grants are available for fire stations, equipment, training, hazmat equipment, and other resources. State level funds are available from sources not specifically identified, which is different than funds specifically identified for school construction. **Funding Plans are required** by Code § 22.402 and 22.403.

The Columbia Downtown Housing Corporation (CDHC) fully supports and respectfully requests County Council approval of the funding for the New Cultural Center (NCC) included in the Administration's FY 2021 budget. Council approval is the lynchpin for moving forward with the first Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) development included in the affordable residential development plan for Downtown Columbia enacted by HR-52-2016 et. al and the Developer Rights and Responsibilities Agreement (DRRA) executed in accordance with that legislation.

CDHC has worked diligently to implement the DRRA, including brainstorming with the Administration and the Commission on how to ensure the necessary funding for the development of the Toby's site. The housing and non-residential components of the development have been inextricably linked since inception. Without funding for the NCC, the housing component, now known as Artists Flats, cannot proceed and the Commission is at risk of losing substantial federal and state funds for this vitally needed affordable housing community.

CDHC has been proactive yet patient as our partners have worked to develop a viable and doable funding plan. We believe they have done so yet understand that the Council has some concerns. We encourage the Council to work collaboratively with the Administration to approve, with revisions as needed, a funding structure for the development of NCC that will enable the entire development to continue moving forward on schedule.

CDHC has committed \$2.5M to Artists Flats, which will contain approximately 180 total units (50% affordable), including the corresponding parking garage spaces. The remaining funding

Successful progress for the affordable housing components of the plan are tied to benchmarks related to both commercial and residential (both market-rate and affordable) development in the downtown. Thus, delays or the loss of this first LIHTC development may have repercussions concerning future downtown development.

None of us could have foreseen the current pandemic confronting this nation, and CDHC very much appreciates the tough decisions that must be made to ensure the health and well-being of the county and its residents. We know that many in our community have suffered greatly from coronavirus and will continue to feel its effects into the future. In our view, the need for quality affordable housing in our county will only increase as we begin a phased reopening of our community and look to get back to work. That will severely damage their ability to serve the community of people who need their mental health services.

Well, that didn't take long at all...nothing like a "crisis" to come up with schemes to raise taxes.

Of course our county Administration wants to raise taxes "on the rich", except, of course, the electorate as a whole is always "the rich" when all is said and done.

The proposed increases in transfer and recordation taxes will raise the cost to buy or sell ANY home or property in Howard County, not just higher priced homes as has been reported by our county exec and his tax increase advocates. On my short street, there are <u>four families</u> who work outside Howard County, three of them who work in Montgomery County—the county with the highest property and other sundry taxes in the state. I know they will be absolutely delighted about this proposal to making closing costs on Howard County's average priced home the second highest in the State, right behind Montgomery County!

Not only will this tax impact buyers and sellers of homes, it will create a significant competitive disadvantage and impair Howard County's ability to address our low commercial tax base. As a recipient, the NFRC was a lifesaver when I found myself facing an unsolicited divorce and had no mental resources to handle my own emotional needs, much less those of my 9 year old daughter. Because of the care and the programming that was implemented by the thoughtful counselors and staff of the NFRC, my daughter and I were both able to find a 'soft place to land' and came through emotionally intact. Indeed, my daughter is currently graduating Wesleyan University with a double major in psychology and French. She has worked as a peer health counselor for the NFRC and has now extended that commitment to serve others by working as an online counselor for an organization that offers mental health services to youth. This has been a crucial resource for the young people that she serves especially during this pandemic.

And it is becoming increasingly evident during this time that mental health services are a critical need in the community as people struggle to cope with the physical, emotional, and financial repercussions of COVID-19.

As a Board member, I add the following:

- Our funding history since 2013 was \$28,000 a year with an increase to \$29,280 just last year after petitioning when the Community Services Partnership office recommended a cut to \$14,000 last year. We are currently asking for only \$28,000 for FY21.
- We are puzzled by the cuts to our funding. It appears that every other non-profit was awarded the same as last year. We are more than willing to meet with the council, but missed the opportunity to testify, because we were alerted about the funding allocated to NFRC *after* the deadline to sign up to testify.

One of the major reasons I moved to Howard County with my family, left my position in Prince Georges County and decided to work for the Howard County Public School System as the Director for Student Services, was the value the leaders in this county, including the County Executive and Superintendent of Schools, at that time, placed on the **mental health and well-being of children and families in Howard County**. I also was amazed to learn there was a Center that specifically focused on supporting the emotional well-being of children and their parents who were going through a **separation or divorce**, and for children who had parents, never married, but were ending their relationship.

The *National Family Resiliency Center (NFRC)*, previously known as **The Center for Children of Separation and Divorce**, continues to provide parent and co-parent education seminars in both Spanish and English, individual and group therapy for children, teens and adults, and co-parenting education classes which include assisting and teaching co-parents how to communicate respectfully as they develop their **child-focused parent plan**, which is now a requirement to have in Maryland for parents who are separating or divorcing.

I have seen first-hand, the impact a divorce and/or separation has had on children and adolescents who are caught in the middle of their parents' conflict, as they often internalize their feelings and take on a huge responsibility of guilt for their parent's problems. As a way of protecting themselves from further disappointment and emotional pain, they often **disengage from their friends**, **from school**, and from their parents. These are the children for whom the NFRC provides counseling and support. Parents who are engaged in 'custody battles' or who are 'fighting' to win custody and not focused on what's in the best interest of their children, are those parents with whom the NFRC works to teach how to co-parent for their children's emotional and mental well-being.

It was very upsetting to learn today that the funding recommendation for FY21 for the National Family Resiliency Center (NFRC) would be **cut by more than half**....from \$29, 280. to \$14,000. The number of children bearing the brunt of their parent's divorce, at a great cost to them, is growing in Howard County and state-wide. This pandemic has certainly put additional stress on families who were already struggling to cope during their transition. The emotional pain, grief and loss children are feeling, is often not recognized by their parents, their teachers, their school counselors or the community. Continuing to fund the NFRC at previous levels, will enable the staff at the NFRC to continue to offer training to our schools and in our community, on-line and in person, and provide the unique services and supports for families in conflict. In addition, because it is **now** a requirement of the Maryland Judiciary for parents to complete **The Maryland Parenting Plan Tool (CC-DR-109 [01/2020])** and NFRC staff, including myself, specifically teach parents how to complete this plan, I am respectfully asking Dr. Ball and members of the Council to please reconsider this funding cut and fully fund the National Family Resiliency Center. Thank you.

My Name is Kathleen Helt, I have been the Associate Director of the National Family Resiliency Center, Inc. (NFRC) since 1991. I grew up in Howard County in a family that believes in community services. Most of my family has served in the Howard County Fire Service for three generations both as volunteers and professionals. I wrote a much longer letter last year so will not repeat what I wrote previously

I made a decision to stay at NFRC because of its mission and vision and a caring, committed staff. We have two full time staff, (Risa and Kathy), three part time administrative assistants/receptionists, seven therapists and eighteen part time parent educators. We have never had any benefits, medical or retirement and in terms of paid vacation, we each have so many accrued hours we could take several months in vacation. So you see, it is not about money or lack of benefits. We are committed! Risa, as Executive Director is an extraordinary leader who out paces anyone I know in terms of her energy and work. She works two jobs. She is both executive director and a talented therapist who brings in revenue to the center through her counseling. We have had some incredibly talented therapists who have been with us for many years, several more than twenty years. Each could otherwise have had a thriving private practice but they chose NFRC because of the teamwork, leadership and mission.

I am shocked that the CSP office is recommending a 50% cut in our grant when all other agencies are being funded at last year's level. We are serving more individuals and families this current fiscal year through educational programs as well as therapy, so the need for funding is as important as ever. Currently our therapists are working hard to serve as many families as possible through tele-therapy even though many of our clients are unable to pay at this time due to loss of jobs or furloughs. No one is turned away.

I ask that you find the funds to be equitable to NFRC and fund our organization at the same level you are funding other agencies at last fiscal year's level.



Hello,

My name is Tara Salvati. I am both a teacher and parent of three students in the Howard County Public School system. We are a military family who has lived in the county for six years and we decided to be geographically separated from my husband, an active duty Army pilot this year, so that our children could go back to their elementary school and I could return to my high school teaching position. Times are difficult. Money is tight and the world is literally in crisis mode. I appreciate all of this and am well aware that sacrifices must be made. I need to express, however, how some of these sacrifices will have indelible impacts.

Due to the increasing of class sizes next year, there are less world language positions available in my school. Because I previously taught ESOL in the building and have not been there as long as some of my colleagues, I will have to either be split between schools or part-time next year. Because I, a certified Spanish teacher will not be there, my classes will be taught by a uncertified French teacher. While this teacher is incredible and amazing, having someone teach out of their content area is a disservice to the teacher and the students. It also ensures that two language programs will be killed, French and Spanish, because neither is receiving the expertise it deserves. While the academic impact there sincerely worries me, I am troubled more by the emotional impact these cuts will have. We have homeless students, abused students, lost students and students who just need a challenge. How can any teacher be expected to to reach all of these vast needs in an overcrowded classroom? How can any student build a positive relationship with a teacher or school that becomes more and more detached and impersonal with constant turnover and overcrowding?

I believe in the power of schools to create communities and change lives for the better. I believed the messages we were told by real estate agents and Human Resources employees who told us that HOCO had a great school system and that they hired the best teachers. What I am left to question is what do you believe? You cannot believe in the importance of academics if it doesn't matter to you who teaches what to your students and that no one can access the curriculum because it's too impersonal. You cannot believe in relationships being the central focus of education if you constantly rip teachers from their students and schools to save a few dimes. And you cannot believe that schools are the foundation of our communities if you are not willing to sacrifice more for them. Please consider our community's values when thinking about these budget needs.

For 33 years I have been involved with this non-profit that changed my life and my relationship with my father. I say father because he was just a "father" figure 33 years ago. I went through the HS group and the first MFS session my father's eyes opened and he took it to heart what was being said. It is the most powerful thing that parents have to sit and listen to their kids talk without saying a word. My father got the help that was needed for himself at 22 I finally felt I had a dad to talk to, there is a difference between a father and a dad. For the fist time he actually listened to what I had to say and I was not scared to talk to him for the first time. My dad used to be so angry, without this program and not having a lot of money the sliding scale fee is what made my mom afford to send me. I was asked to be a peer counselor after a few groups and I did this for years and am still a Peer Counselor and now on the Board of Directors as Board President supporting NFRC. Statement of Matthew H. Fleming (Ellicott City Partnership) to the Howard County Council, 6 May 2020

Council Chair Jung, Vice Chair Walsh, and Councilmembers Jones, Rigby, and Yungmann, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony to the 6 May 2020 budget hearing. My name is Matthew Fleming. I'm the President of the Ellicott City Partnership (ECP; I represent the ECP, and am also a resident). The ECP is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization founded in 2013 with the merger of the Ellicott City Business Association and the Ellicott City Restoration Foundation. The ECP works to preserve the heritage and vitality of Old Ellicott City while creating and enhancing economic growth (its mission); it seeks a vibrant, economically sustainable historic community (its vision). The ECP's constituents comprise businesses, property owners, residents, and visitors to Old Ellicott City; its partners include county and state departments and agencies, as well as local nonprofits. Through the work of the ECP, Old Ellicott City was officially designated a Maryland Main Street Community in 2014, and the ECP continues to administer that program in partnership with the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development.

The ECP's efforts directly and indirectly increase jobs, labor income, tax revenues, property values, and the reputation of Howard County as one of the best places to live in the United States. These efforts have been indispensable as Old Ellicott City has continued its aggressive recovery from the flood events of 2016 and 2018 and beyond. I draw your attention to recent evidence of ECP impact: hundreds of events hosted, assisted, and promoted by the ECP in the last year, including the iconic Main Street Music Fest, 41st annual Midnight Madness, and Mardi Gras on Main. By all accounts, this programming was overwhelmingly successful, with many Old Ellicott City businesses reporting their best days in years. The ECP also launched the new VisitOEC.com website in 2019 (averaging 27k monthly views) and welcomed 20+ new businesses to town.

Now we find ourselves in unprecedented times, with the world facing the global COVID-19 pandemic. For the third time in four years, Old Ellicott City businesses have had to suspend normal operations—and the work of the ECP has become more essential than ever. Indeed, the needs of the community have grown, requiring intensive and expanded strategic focus and more purposeful, longer-term ECP programming. In response, the ECP has served as critical connective tissue between local, state, and federal government and ECP constituents, not least in highlighting available financial assistance to those in dire financial straits. For example, the ECP has:

 organized multiple virtual meetings with County Executive Ball, Vice Chair Walsh, State Senator Katie Hester, State Delegate Courtney Watson, and representatives of the Howard County Economic Development Authority, Visit Howard County, and Howard County Chamber, on crisis grants and loans;



- provided technical assistance to businesses on expansion of e-commerce and other related offerings;
- promoted Old Ellicott City businesses offering online/curbside shopping and gift cards;
- liaised with the multi-stakeholder Howard County Community Organizations Active in Disaster group to share information on collective community needs/opportunities; and
- facilitated the provision of feedback from ECP constituents to local, state, and federal elected officials.

The ECP is a lean, efficient organization that provides the county a significant return on investment. Through its all-volunteer board of directors and its army of volunteers from Howard County and beyond, the ECP provides its constituents with the combined services of more than 5,000 volunteer hours annually (often provided by subject-matter experts in fields relating to public policy, public- and private-sector management, marketing/communications, retail innovation, event planning, historic preservation and environmental protection, and the like). Volunteer hours are complemented by a mix of county funding, grants, donations, and event proceeds (though clearly no in-person ECP events—to include SpringFest, the ECP's large spring music festival—have been possible since stay-home orders were issued).

County funding is the bedrock upon which the ECP is built, allowing the ECP to execute its vital mission. We're grateful to County Executive Ball for his continued support for the ECP, including via his FY2021 budget request; we would be grateful for your support in this regard as well. FY2021 county funding will allow the ECP to continue to lessen the burden on county government—as a force-multiplier—by providing constituents with critical services and maintaining the Main Street Maryland designation. FY2021 county funding will also allow the ECP to continue to innovate in its programming to meet strategic constituent needs—so critical in these unprecedented times.

The ECP stands devoted to Old Ellicott City and Howard County, and looks forward to continuing its close working relationship with county partners. **On behalf of the ECP and its constituents, thank you for your time and consideration**.

My children were socially isolating, giving up sports, music, and clubs, my exhusband whose company is located and employs many HOCO residents was unable to focus on career, as a mother I could barely hang on. My participation in volunteering and fundraising was nil as I attempted to get help for us all during our divorce. NFRC provided every resource for each of us collectively and individually. It was painful and horrid yet they provided us with the tools to take many broken pieces and make us whole again. Allowing for healthy renewed relationships amongst each family member. Including my ex and myself.

What is significant about this is not just the magic of NFRC tremendous efforts in helping us redefine our family, provide save and supportive community to heal in—but the unexpected outcomes it provided within the community. You see when you have healthy individuals who have been giving tools to heal—the trickle down effect happens within the community. My children were leading participants in several state champion sports teams, my child was accepted into Ivy League schools where prior she wanted to drop out and stay w me. My children participated in several community fundraisers and food donations to the food pantry.

I returned to the efforts I put forth in volunteering at my kids school as well as local non profit club for girls. Lastly, my ex may not have been able to be well enough to return to work and help his company grow and hire significantly more HOCO folks.

None of that would have been possible if we did not get the intervention and services NFRC provided. It helped our family as well as the branches of our lives we connect to within the community. That is called a vital community agency that provides more that the eye can see.

Next as a Peer Counselor— NFRC has programming not just for within its programming and clients but the community itself. Touching all areas of the county. Legal— educating Judges and Lawyers on the issues involved as well as the depth of impact divorce has on families with the hope to prevent a court battle that is painful for all.

NFRC provides training and awareness to our educators as well. Giving them the tools to identify and refer a student or parent that may need support. From a financial perspective NFRC assists with referrals to help families navigate ways to address how to divide their funds that are in best interest of family.

I could continue on. There are so many special and amazing parts of this agency. It's staff are unique in their dedication, passion and caring for their clients. They have worked hard to secure other funding and create on line portals to help their clients.

Currently our world has been facing a crisis that will have many trickle down effect outcomes. Due to the nature of this pandemic those stressors will ultimately crack a family that is already fractured. Now is the time to insure that family agency like NFRC

is in a position to support these families.

CHRONOLOGY and HISTORY

- Kathy Helt, Associate Director wrote to Megan Godfrey at the Office of Community Partnerships Monday morning at 7 AM stating that we had not yet received an email or letter, as we had in the past, stating the recommended amount of funding, from the Office of Community Services.
- When we did not hear from Megan, we decided to reach out to the Director of the Association of Community Services, who she said she was informed funding was to stay the same for grant recipients. She is NOT part of the County government. She would not have known the specific amount we received last year.
- Ms. Godfrey replied to our request at 2:39 AM Weds morning May 6.

- Why did Ms. Godfrey wait until 2:39 AM on 5/6 to email when the deadline to testify expired at 7 pm, the evening before her middle of the night email.
- In the past, NFRC has received notification about the recommended amount of funding several days prior to any hearings. When Ms. Godfrey emails, she stated: "The proposed FY21 Howard County Budget presented by the County Executive includes \$8,438,369 in funding for CSP Human Service Grants. Based on the recommendations from the grant review process coordinated by the Department of Community Resources and Services, funding has been included for National Family Resiliency Center, Inc. in the FY21 Budget for approval by the County Council. The list of proposed award levels for CSP Operating and One-Time Grants can be found on page 381/382 (Adobe page 398/399) of the FY21 Proposed Operating Budget."
 - On Dec. 9, 2019, Risa and Kathy met with the two administrators at the Office of Community Partnerships to discuss updates to our work. We wanted to share what we had added based on our own goals and their recommendations. These changes included adding more board members, increasing fundraising, and continued growth in counseling services. There seemed little interest on their part and they did not like us challenging them about the importance of our work and our need for continued funding. We left feeling deflated with little to no sense of support.

I hope you are staying safe and healthy. My name is Meghna Sreenivas and I am a resident in your district. I'm a graduate of Reservoir High School and a current senior at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business. While we have not met personally, I have had the pleasant opportunity to interact with other members of the council and Dr. Ball, while I was leading the student government at Reservoir and actively participating in the county-level student affairs.

Today, I am writing in support of \$29,280 for the National Family Resiliency Center, Inc. I am shocked to hear that the county is recommending that the funding be dropped to \$14,000 this year, despite the extremely important work that this organization has done for individuals, lawyers, judges, and the broader family courts in Howard County.

As a child of a messy divorce and the subsequent death of my father, the NFRC was pivotal in getting me and my family back on my feet. Therapists, such as Dr. Risa Garon, have profoundly influenced my life - she is the reason why I turned my life around and ended up representing Howard County at an Ivy League Institution. When my father passed away, Risa was the first person I called and she stayed awake with me as I cried at 3am.

Even while in college, I have made it a point to serve as a peer counselor to support new co-parents during this transition. The NFRC has such a powerful message to share; its clients come back and want to continue to share the message.

When I was in high school, the NFRC encouraged me to speak out about my experience and participate in Howard County Ignite's speaking event, where I shared the stage with former County Executive, Allan Kittleman. I encourage you to watch it here to understand the experience I went through.

I am sure you are getting many inquiries just like this, as the budget gets updated. At this time, the amount that has been slated for the National Family Resiliency Center, Inc. for FY21 is barely half of the total that the organization received during FY20 which came from more than one source. What is most disheartening is that NFRC was informed that their funding for FY21 would be the same as for FY20 but this was incorrect. The error in communication only became clear this morning - too late to be able to testify via video. My divorce was done by mid-2009 but that was only the beginning of my relationship with NFRC. I have volunteered as a Peer Counselor at NFRC since early 2010 and have personally witnessed the transformation of many women from frightened and uncertain of their future to becoming strong enough to face the future head on. You see, it helps when you hear other women's stories of success who began their journeys with the same uncertainty and fear of the future.

NFRC helps the women face their new futures with the knowledge that they don't walk the journey alone but have the support they need. As amazing as NFRC is with the women they are an incredible resource when helping the children of divorce in Howard County. NFRC not only supports the children by helping their parents become strong and independent they also help the children by sponsoring groups where the children can grow and become stronger and more confident in their own right.

I saw NFRC provide support free of charge to a family that desperately needed their services during the Great Recession when both parents were out of work. The do what needs to be done and give help to those who need it.

They are a critical resource that is needed more than ever during this time of health and economic uncertainty. Howard County needs NFRC to help the community get through this time of uncertainty. NFRC has been recognized by many for the good work that they do time and time again.

Dear Howard County Council members,

On behalf of Bridges to Housing Stability, Inc. in Howard County, I am writing in support of the proposed operating budget for the Community Service Partnership (CSP) funding through the Department of Community Resources and services, and the budget for the Howard County Department of Housing and Community Development.

We understand that it is a tight financial time for the county, and appreciate the County Executive's consideration to keep funding level for CSP grants and Plan to End Homelessness (PEH) dollars. For thirty years Bridges has provided rehousing services for low income households and those experiencing homelessness in the county. Thousands of individuals have been impacted and stably housed long term. We are anticipating a struggle to raise the same amount of fundraising dollars in the coming year due to the uncertainty in holding large events. Knowing that the CSP and Plan to End Homelessness dollars will be level helps us to continue to serve the most vulnerable, employ 15 staff, and help those whose housing may be in jeopardy in the coming year because of job loss or sickness caused by the pandemic. We will continue to work with the Department of Community Resources and Services, and the Coalition to End Homelessness to move forward in keeping homelessness rare, brief, and nonrecurring in Howard County.

The Howard County Department of Housing and Community Development support allows Bridges to continue to provide additional scattered site affordable housing solutions to low income households making 30-60% of Howard County Median Income along with strengthening relationships with landlords and providing support services to keep these households stable. Affordable housing for these low income households that often have housing barriers is very scarce in Howard County. The seventy five households that have been housed through our Housing Connections and Bridges Alliance programs depend on the below market rents, and support services to remain housed. None of these households would have housing in the county if it wasn't for the support of the Howard County Department of Housing and Community Development through the years.

Bridges continues to leverage the funding received through CSP, PEH, and DHCD grants with hundreds of thousands in other funding to continue the work and lower the percentage of the organization's budget that comes from the County.

I hope you will support these items in the budget. Many other organizations that serve thousands of County residents can continue the great work they do thanks to the CSP and PEH funding. Many thanks to all of you for your service to the County.

Testimony

As Executive Director of the Association of Community Services, it is my privilege to offer testimony on behalf of our over 170 nonprofit member organizations and community advocates who work diligently on behalf of vulnerable populations in our community. Our nonprofit sector values our strong collaborative relationship with the County as together we strive to meet the needs of residents. As we respond to the COVID-19 crisis and help our residents recover from the impacts of it, this relationship will be critical to keeping our community strong and thriving.

First, I would like to offer *our* sincere gratitude for your ongoing support for the NonProfit Collaborative. Now in its fourth year, the Collaborative continues to broaden its reach and impact in Howard County. Our tenants continue to build collaborations and partnerships, expand their programs as well as the number of people served. and more effectively serve residents by referring clients with multiple needs to others service providers within the NPC and on the Community Resources Campus. Having a hub where these services can be more easily accessed and coordinated will help residents recover from the impact of the current pandemic. The NPC also serves as an important resource to the broader nonprofit community and has seen a 50% increase in the number of outreach meetings and programs held at the NPC by local nonprofits.

ACS also applauds the County for its commitment to affordable housing. We look forward to the creation of a Housing Opportunities Master Plan that provides a clear path for expanding and preserving affordable housing that is critical to the 22% of Howard County households with incomes of less than \$60,000 who struggle to make ends meet. This percentage will likely increase as more residents experience unemployment, furloughs, and reductions in hours.

We would like to note a few key opportunities to strengthen support for both nonprofits and the Howard County residents we serve:

• We appreciate the careful review of the Community Service Partnership (CSP) grant program and are confident that it will result in a process that better serves our community. While level funding for FY21 originally promised to provide stability to grant recipients as the CSP process is revised, this is no longer the case. We are concerned that as the need has vastly increased and our nonprofits financial stability has been seriously threatened by the COVID—19 crisis, stable funding will not be adequate to ensure that our nonprofits can meet the many critical needs in our community. Needs across the service continuum from housing and utility assistance, to mental and behavioral health, to food, childcare and transportation have dramatically increased. The hope is that emergency funding from the federal government will be available to help our nonprofits as they assist residents in recovering.

- We congratulate the Department of Community Resources and Services for its dedication to serving the homeless and it release of updated Plan to End Homelessness, The Path Home.
 Adequate funding of this plan will be critical to making this vision and priority for the County a reality.
- HCPSS will face increasing challenges as their students cope with the impact of the current crisis.
 Adequate funding for the Student Services Offices will be imperative. HCPSS will undoubtedly see a spike in the need for mental health, psychological and counseling services during the FY20-21 school year and Pupil Personnel Workers will be responding to expanding caseloads as more students and families will require additional support.
- We strongly support funding for the Office of Transportation's infrastructure projects. A more
 robust investment in building and improving sidewalks, crosswalks and other projects will
 improve safety and connectivity for pedestrians. We encourage the County to prioritize
 communities using the Vulnerable Population Index, as specified in CR-120, to identify spaces
 where the need for sidewalks, crosswalks, bus stops, and bike lanes are the greatest, such as
 Guilford, Elkridge, Savage and Jessup.

Finally, I applaud the commitment, creativity and spirit of collaboration that our County government has exhibited in responding to the COVID-19 crisis. This will need to be supported with additional funding and/or flexibility in FY21 to keep County departments and nonprofit service providers stable and capable of responding to the surge in need in the coming months.

Dear Dr. Ball and Esteemed County Council Members,

I am an attorney and businessperson with an office in Ellicott City. I have been practicing law in Maryland since 1995, primarily in Howard County since 2004, and my partner, Victor Berger and I started our own law firm in Ellicott City in 2009. I am writing as it has come to my attention that NFRC stands to lose a significant portion of their annual grant funding.

During the course of my career, I have served hundreds of Howard County residents in a variety of roles from attorney to mediator. I am also collaboratively trained. The focus of our practice is to work with our clients to resolve matters amicably wherever possible. While this is ALWAYS important in our view, this is especially true this year in light of the current pandemic and the current unavailability of the Courts which will be followed by a significant backlog due to several months of postpones cases.

I have routinely worked with NFRC for many, many years on numerous cases. They are an invaluable resource to me and my clients in our practice and by extension to the citizens of Howard County as a whole. There is not a neighborhood or school in our County that has not been touched by divorce and custody issues. Any loss of funding to NFRC would be a terrible blow not only to their organization, but to the families, children and professionals in our community.

NFRC is involved in coordination with the Circuit Court for Howard County to provide parenting programs and co-parenting mediation services to the benefit of our court system, legal and mental health professionals and for our citizens during a time of tremendous stress and transition. Beyond my professional affinity for NFRC, I have been divorced myself. I can personally attest to what their influence meant to me and my exwife during the time of our divorce as we went through the parenting classes described above many years ago. With the lessons learned during those difficult days, my ex-wife and I now look forward to the 'virtual' graduation of our daughter from Long Reach High School in a few weeks, and then on to a college career at Northeastern University. I know that many of our daughters friends and classmates have been impacted by the ravages of divorce, and those who were touched by NFRC are better off for their involvement.

NFRC has long been a source of pride for Howard County family law practitioners as other colleagues in other jurisdictions lament the fact that they do not have an organization like NFRC in their jurisdictions. The practice culture in Howard County is different than any other jurisdiction in which I practice, and I believe that is due in large part to the influence and support of NFRC. I know that this letter comes at a time of challenging budget decisions due to the ravages of the Coronavirus and that local programs will have cuts because of budget issues. With that said, I would urge you to do everything possible to keep NFRC fully funded so that they may continue to play their role in making Howard County among the greatest places to live and work in our entire country.

I strongly urge you to reject Amendment 12 and restore full funding for the energy improvement fund (CO329).

The proposed energy improvements are important contributions to Howard County's commitment to meaningful climate action. Energy efficiency is the <u>cheapest source of "new" power</u> and is one of the most effective ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Energy efficiency is also the healthiest way to satisfy energy requirements because it reduces the need to generate power <u>from nuclear (34% in 2018) or dirty sources such as natural gas (22%) or coal (23%)</u>. For every kWh of power we don't use because of energy efficiency, we avoid the carbon pollution and environmental damage from electricity generation.

It is my understanding that the following projects would be eliminated by Amendment 12:

- Retro commissioning of Grassroots Center, Central Library, Ascend One, George Howard Building (payback time: 5 months)
- Relamp Long Reach Village Center and Other Critical Buildings with Outdated Lighting (payback time: 2 years)
- EV Charging Stations and Annual Charger Maintenance
- Generator conversion in Ascend one, Scaggsville Public Safety Center, Detention Center, & Public Safety Training Center (payback time: 3-6 years).

These projects will reduce power use by 2.85 million kWh, save 73,000 gallons of fuel and reduce greenhouse gas emissions (in CO2 equivalents) by 2595 metric tons. This is equal to removing the pollution caused by 552 cars for a year. These projects will clean the air and reduce the pace of climate change.

But the best thing about energy efficiency is how quickly it pays for itself. These projects have a payback time ranging from 5 months to just a few years. - The construction on the East Columbia 50+ Center was set to begin this summer (2020). Reduced funding means that the Center cannot be built now causing a delay for the project of at least a year, perhaps longer. Delaying the project will increase the overall costs of construction. Dear Council,

I write to ask for your support for Amendment 14 to CR25-2020 which will separate the North Columbia Fire Station from the project for the fields at Harper's Choice Middle School. You may recall, this was my request when I testified at the budget hearing. The projects are about a half-mile apart and having been separated in location have little relationship to one another in scope.

After watching the work session, it is still unclear how much of the price increase in the fire station was due to the increased square footage, increases in construction costs, or the costs for the fields, parking areas, driveways, and intersection improvements at Cedar Lane and Rivendell Lane. It also remains unclear regarding the funding source for the fields, parking and intersection improvements; are the funds coming from the fire tax and the fire portion of the transfer tax or from other sources?

It also remains unclear on the need for the fields or whether Harper's Choice is the appropriate place for the fields. The fields unlike those proposed for the East Columbia Library, Troy Park, or Blandair Park are not in the Recreation and Parks master plan.

Separation will clarify the sources of funding and the steps in the development process. The middle school is in New Town while the Cedar Lane Park properties are not.

Community Outreach

The County's community outreach for the project is rather mixed. As I have stated previously, I serve on the Harper's Choice Village Board. County presentations to the Village Board last fall and winter were canceled without explanation or detail. On March 3, 2020, Kim Pruim was on the agenda to give an update. A presentation from the County Executive's staff was not unexpected. During the prior administration, Grace Fielhaur came to a Board meeting and discussed the status of the fire station project. However, rather than a low-key update, Ms. Pruim came with an entourage including, the Director of Public Works, the Acting Fire Chief, the Assistant Fire Chief, HCDFRS staff, the fire station consultant, the Director of Recreation and Parks, and Mark Stromdahl. Councilmember Jung also attended. Neither the Village Manager nor Board were given prior notice of the County officials that would be attending the meeting.

At this Board meeting, the community was first informed that the fire station was being moved to the East Area of Cedar Lane Park and that fields would be constructed at the middle school. The previous iteration of the plan had the fire station AND the fields at the middle school—as an offer of appeasement to the community for the loss of the open space. At that time, the fire station project also included the demolition of the Old Cedar Lane School. However, when Mark Stromdahl testified to the Planning Board for the capital project, he incorrectly stated that the fields had community support. This is just not true; the COMMUNITY, other than those attending the Village Board meeting, had never had an opportunity to comment on the latest plan with the fire station at Cedar Lane Park and only new fields at the middle school.

In addition, though the Harper's Choice Community Association and the Heritage Green Townhouse Association were involved in the planning and hosting of previous community meetings for the fire station, neither received notice of the Planning Board's Capital Project Hearings.

The March 19, 2020 Planning Board Capital Project Public Hearing

The newspaper notice for the first planned Planning Board hearing was fatally defective as it stated the date of the meeting was March 5 (the publication date) and not March 19, 2020.

Notice of Public Hearing

The Howard County Planning Board will hold a public hearing on new and substantially modified capital projects that have been requested by County agencies to be included in the County Executive's proposed FY2021 Capital Budget and the FY2022-FY2031 Ten-Year Capital Improvement Master Plan. The hearing is scheduled for March 5, 2020 at 7:00 PM in the Banneker Room of the George Howard Building, 3430 Courthouse Drive, Ellicott City, MD 21043. This notice is provided as required by Section 22.403(b)(3) (iii) of the Howard County Code. A brief description follows of the proposed new and substantially modified capital projects:

NEW CAPITAL PROJECTS

F5976 A new project to construct a 13,500 SF fire station on Route 108 to establish emergency services in a strategic position in the North Columbia area to relieve the demands associated with increased population density and call demands.

3/5, 3/12/2020 6622275

Though the newspaper stated that the project was on Route 108, the signs were posted in Harper's Choice. The project at the Harpers Choice Middle School no longer involved a fire station. It was a misstatement of material fact to refer to a "fire station" near Harper's Choice Middle School when it is now only planned to be athletic fields.



The sign placed at Rivendell and Cedar Lane was located 0.6 miles as the crow flies from the actual location of the fire station.





Section 22.403 of the Howard County Code requires that the sign be posted on the County property or on a public right-of-way. The sign in the photo was on Columbia Association property. The sign was not posted on either the right-of-way, on the Recreation and Park property, or on the DPW water tower property. Furthermore, the sign at the intersection of Rivendell and Harpers Farm Road was not the nearest public right-of-way to the property. It was 0.82 miles from the location of the fire station.

For the March 19, 2020 hearing, a sign was never observed posted at the actual location of the fire station in East Cedar Lane Park.

The April 9, 2020 Planning Board Capital Project Public Hearing

The March 19, 2020 Planning Board meeting having been canceled, the hearing was rescheduled for April 9, 2020. The sign placement for the Planning Board's hearing on April 9, 2020 were the reverse of those for the March 19 meeting. There were no signs for the capital project near the Harper's Choice Middle School. The sign below was at the East Area of Cedar Lane Park on or about March 26, 2020.



On April 9, 2020, I made formal motions and objections regarding the notice for the Planning Board. The Planning Board rejected the concerns and denied the motions.

At the next meeting of the Planning Board on April 23, 2020, Director of Planning and Zoning, Amy Gowan, though the motion had previously been denied, was given an opportunity to respond to the objections in the April 9 motions. During her presentation, Director Gowan deceptively told the Planning Board that the sign stated that the meeting would be held virtually and not at the George Howard Building. However, as can be seen the sign at East Area of Cedar Lane Park did not have the virtual location for the meeting. As some unknown time subsequent to March 26, the sign was amended to cross out the George Howard Building address lines and add the virtual information. It is unknown whether these changes were made prior to or after the April 9, 2020 hearing before the Planning Board.

Conclusion

For the reasons and issues discussed above, I urge the Council to adopt Amendment 14. The Amendment will separate the projects which will actually benefit the fire station project by not having it burdened by issues of the Harper's Choice Middle School fields. Furthermore, the amendment will assure that the community is involved and that the HCPSS grants its approval for the use of its school fields.

Dear Councilperson Rigby and Howard County Council Members:

I am the President of the Clark's Crossing Community in Columbia, Maryland, and I am writing to respectfully request your support for the budget cuts proposed by Councilpersons Walsh, Jung and Yungmann which will be voted on later today. I address Councilperson Rigby first because our community is within Council District 3, but as we are a small tight knit county, I also share our thoughts with the entire council. I am sorry that this entire process has moved so quickly right before a holiday weekend that we did not have an opportunity to address you prior to this time, and we understand that this request is contrary to the current position of our councilperson. Nevertheless we request that you keep an open mind and consider our opinions as a community as you move to a final vote.

Our community is a middle-class townhouse community in Columbia. We are neither a rich nor a poor community. Our median home sale price is approximately \$40,000 less than the median price for Howard County as a whole. And we are comprised of young families with children, retirees on fixed incomes, white collar workers, blue collar workers, government employees and private sector employees, and today, unemployed people as well. We are comprised of immigrant families from all parts of the world who immigrated at many different times over many generations. We are white and black, Christian, Jewish and Muslim. In short, we are a microcosm of this wonderful county.

Despite our great diversity, when we learned very recently about this upcoming vote and I reached out to my Board and our residents for their opinions, of everyone who responded, the response on this issue was uniform and without a single exception. During this time of great crisis and uncertainty, as many of us are facing loss of incomes and even jobs altogether, we are pulling our belts tighter and adjusting our spending to meet our in many cases reduced incomes. We do not have a switch we can pull and increase our incomes, so we are adjusting our spending. This is both at our individual household level, as well as at our community association level.

Respectfully, we request that Howard County government do the same thing. Many of us are making spending cuts in our homes of things that could be valuable and important. We are cutting more than just frivolous expenses. If we are making the hard choices in our homes, Howard County government should do the same thing. It is hard for us to understand how in operating and capex budgets of nearly \$2 Billion, prudent spending cuts cannot be found to make spending match revenue, rather than the reverse.

Many of our owners have expressed special concern that the county is pushing forward with the cultural center in the budget at a time of such great economic crisis. The concerns are not so much with the project itself as with the timing. We love the arts as much as any community, and understand that low and income median housing can be a valuable thing, not only in preventing concentrations of poverty, but also in making sure public servants such as teachers, fire fighters, police officers and nurses who protect us, especially in these difficult times, are not priced out of living in our great county. But the timing is not this year, and we do not have the right to mortgage our children's future by spending more money than we have. This is how we run our households. This is how we should run our county. And we should absolutely only spend within the constraints set by the Howard County spending affordability committee. Fiscal discipline and prudence requires this.

I know the hour is late and the vote is close at hand. But we respectfully request that our elected officials keep an open mind and consider our community's opinion, even received at this late hour. Many thanks to each of you for your dedication and service to this great county.

Dear Councilmembers,

I am writing to express my dismay and frustration regarding the budget cuts for FY21 Capital and Operating Budgets. I tuned in a few times to the work sessions in between working on the volunteer projects I continue to work on for the PTA and for my community and helping my kids with their online learning. Frankly, I'm disappointed by how sloppily this is being handled. The massive cuts being proposed clearly have not been carefully considered by some of you and I urge you to think about the long-term impacts of your decisions. Not knowing how many positions your budget cuts impact in each department is unacceptable.

I am writing as a private citizen, but to give a little background, I have served on the SAAC for two years in a row and I understand the big picture (at least slightly better than the average resident) when it comes to how complex the counties needs are and how much our wonderful amenities cost. I understand that the County already has a challenging time reigning in spending. The SAAC has suggested that the County examine multiple sources for increasing revenue and the County Council has acted on some of those suggestions in the past. The recordation tax increase is one of those suggestions that should be a no brainer. With the potential to bring in over \$20 million, I'm left wondering what any Councilmember is thinking in not supporting this. I hope you've already changed your mind on this, but if you haven't, please provide an explanation because I just don't understand.

I want to reiterate the importance of balancing fiscal responsibility with recognizing the need for economic growth. I shouldn't have to remind elected officials that a county budget is not the same as a household budget. The level of cuts proposed will lead to extreme negligence and will end up costing more in the long run.

As an education advocate, I'm disheartened that after so many years of advocacy from local communities and individual community members that you are considering taking away Complete Streets funding for safer walking paths to school for children (who would then no longer need bus transportation, i.e., savings in transportation costs). I am in disbelief that THREE of you are considering delaying ADA compliance across the county.

Looking through the proposed cuts, I'm frankly terrified at the downstream effects of cutting funding for long delayed improvements to infrastructure, like our roads and sidewalks, which as relayed to the SAAC and I'm sure to you, is already backlogged by over \$50 million.

It's unconscionable that some of you have proposed cuts that will eliminate vacancies and opportunities for jobs within the county. We should be providing as much opportunity for our residents to find employment within our county, especially when so many are already facing new or prolonged unemployment.

While a new cultural center may seem frivolous by name, surely you understand that you would be jeopardizing a potential increase in the much-needed stock in the affordable housing and that you would be leaving tens of millions of federal tax credits on the table. The fact that many teachers and first responders who work in the county can't even afford to live here without a supplemental income should tell you how badly needed affordable housing is for the more vulnerable residents.

Finally, having heard two years in a row, the budget proposal from the Department of Corrections, I cannot fathom what makes you think the detention center can handle any MORE deferred maintenance than it has already been suffering from for years. I was haunted the first time I heard the bare bones budget proposal last year and I continue to worry about the building that is literally falling apart.

In closing, I hope you vote keeping in mind the downstream and long-term effects of your decisions will on the county's growth and health. You will have to make tough decisions, but start with the easiest one and support the increase in the progressive recordation tax.

My name is Larry Corsa and I am president of the Heritage Green Townhouse Association. Our neighborhood is located directly across Cedar and Rivendell Lanes from Cedar Lane Park and the Harpers Choice MS grounds. I represent approximately 200 residents who have been following the North Columbia Fire Station project since we were made aware of it in 2017.

My community supports the need for a fire station serving northern Columbia, and agrees that a site on Route 108 offers the best access, despite traffic concerns. The proposed site for the fire station facility is located within the boundaries of Cedar Lane Park, and uses land from an existing turf field to save time and money; yet there is \$3M available in a contingency fund to build a replacement field and much more a half mile away on Harpers Choice MS grounds.

I am writing to support Amendment 14 to Council Bill CB25-2020 to require a "community outreach meeting including a public presentation and comment process on preliminary site plans". Friday's discussion of this amendment centered around the need for an open and transparent process that provides opportunity for community involvement. Councilman Jones indicated that he was not aware of any non-transparency in the process to date; Chief Anuszewski indicated that there was no intent to be non-transparent; Mr. Delerme stated that "we always have transparency on all our projects."; and Mr. Stromdahl said "I guess I don't necessarily agree that the process really hasn't been transparent" and later added that "we did push to get it into the planning board, so we could get it in this budget this year".

While I have lived in Howard County for twenty years, this fire station project has been my first exposure to the workings of Howard County Government. As an outside observer, the processes seem to be designed almost exclusively around the internal needs of the government participants, and are anything but transparent. I do not mean to imply any ill intent, but it has been a challenge the past three years to stay abreast of events to react in a timely manner, never mind to observe or affect the process in motion. I testified to the Planning Board on March 19th regarding the lack of proper notice and the need to take extraordinary measures in these extraordinary times, rather than as an excuse to do the minimum required.

I appreciate that the new site takes away a soccer field from the east area of Cedar Lane Park and I support the idea that replacement facilities and parking will be added to the west area by the Harpers Choice Middle School. However, the new fields bring along new roads and reconfigured intersections to the school grounds, and these impacts require much more information. I urge the Council to pass Amendment 14 to assure that these additional funds are spent in a manner that includes a large measure of community involvement.

Oh, the North Columbia Fire Station. Okay, so... CD 25, number 12... just wanna go to that page. Oh.

Chairwoman Rigby (00:21):

I think next is your fire station one.

When I inquire, I learn that the limiting factor is hiring good staff. Please don't make any cuts to TR staff. Incidentally, we pay for the Therapeutic Recreation programs, and they are worth it.

HCRP has built a wonderful Therapeutic Recreation program that does not currently meet the growing needs for socialization and community outings for people with disabilities. This is a growing population in Howard County. Please don't cut these services.

Thank you for all your efforts working on the annual budget and all legislation. I appreciate your dedication and long hours. I realize this is an unprecedented time and the economic outcomes are unimaginable. The county will need to adjust the budget accordingly. However, I do not agree with some of the line items in Amendment 12 that are to be cut.

The state of Maryland has a law with a goal of reducing Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions 40% below 2006 levels by 2030. Howard County has committed to reducing GHG emission 45% below 2010 levels by 2030 and to reach zero emissions by 2050.

The impact of zeroing out FY21 funding for C0329 "Energy Management Improvements" would mean nearly 2600 metric tons of GHG emissions that we could have eliminated will be released into our atmosphere each year until those projects are completed. In addition, while these projects have upfront costs, they will save the county money in the future with an average annual savings of \$550,000. See below for breakdown and details.

Additionally, I do not believe funding should be taken away from Environmental compliance (CO313), Watershed drainage and stormwater management projects D1180 and D1181, funding for complete streets projects like school route sidewalks, and funding to create pedestrian and bicycle plans that will lead to increased active transportation, again, reducing GHG emissions.

Kimco and the Village Board were allowed days to testify in conditions where all could hear what was going on and the reactions of those present. This request is simply in the same spirit of fairness. The only reason I can see why you would not delay the hearing is that you have already **PREDETERMINED YOUR VOTE** and your vote is **NOT** on the side of the opponents.

I have sat at most of the hearings and it seems as if Kimco has fed the information provided by various Howard County departments to the Board. It appears as if Kimco wants exceptions to everything including easements, the number of parking spaces allowed per square foot, and of course the zoning from single-family to over 230 apartments (which by the way the exact number of 1, 2, and 3 bedroom apartments has never been clarified). Kimco has also misinformed the board that people use Cedar Lane to get to Rts. 29 and 32. Actually, the quickest way to reach these highways is to drive by two schools (Clemens Crossing and the Seventh Day Adventist school) on Quarterstaff Rd. to Martin Rd. If you have ever driven by the schools when they are in session, you would understand residents' concerns about adding an additional 230+ cars to the mix.

Obviously, we want to ensure affordable housing is available in Howard County. However, the pandemic has given me ample time to walk the neighborhoods/areas of Clarys Forest, Columbia Mall, Merriweather Post Pavilion and Wilde Lake. For lease signs are everywhere. Why build more apartments when the ones already here are not at capacity even with projected county growth?

There has been a suggestion submitted to hold the hearings at Merriweather Post Pavilion or another open forum such as a high school stadium that would allow social distancing. Dear Council Members,

I urge you to reconsider the budget cuts outlined in the budget amendment that you will vote on Wednesday, May 27, specifically the drastic reduction in the funding for construction of the new East Columbia 50+ Center. While I recognize that these are difficult times requiring difficult solutions, it is unwise and unwarranted to cut the Center funding now for the following reasons:

- 1. The construction on the East Columbia 50+ Center was set to begin this summer (2020). Reduced funding means that the Center cannot be built now causing a delay for the project of at least a year, perhaps longer. Delaying the project will increase the overall costs of construction. It has already been delayed resulting in a construction cost increase of \$4 million. In fact, seniors have been waiting over 6 years for that center to be built. Isn't that long enough?
- 2. The planned 50+ Center is not "an unnecessary or unvetted project." The East Columbia 50+ Center is a necessity which will provide much needed services to under-served seniors and the heavily populated community at large. Among other services, plans for the new center would include services for memory-challenged seniors in our community (there are currently no such services in this part of the County).
- 3. A 28% reduction in this project funding represented one of the most severe cuts compared to other projects. Why are seniors being targeted for disproportional sacrifice? We are the fastest growing segment of the population, we pay taxes yet we ask very little from our government. How is this equitable and fiscally fair?

Please reconsider this drastic reduction and restore full funding to the East Columbia 50+ Center. If Howard County is to remain a vibrant, wonderful place to live, it must provide for all its residents. Certainly we seniors are not getting any younger.
