Re: Testimony in Support of CB85-2021

The Howard County Human Rights Commission (HRC) strongly supports Council Bill CB85-2021. This bill contains several important amendments to the Howard County Code, Sections 12.207, 12.207A and 12.217, related to unlawful housing practices, commercial leases, and nonexclusive remedies.

Most important among these is the addition of commercial leasing throughout the list of unlawful housing practices set forth in Section 12.207A. We believe it is just as important that small business owners be protected against discrimination in commercial leases as tenants are when renting residential housing. This will close a significant loophole in the current housing discrimination code.

The amendments to the definition of source of income in Section 12.207 are also needed in order to bring the Howard County Code into conformity with state and federal law. Finally, the amendments to Section 12.217 will allow the Office of Human Rights and Equity (OHRE) or the HRC to terminate administrative proceedings in the event a complainant also sues in any state or federal court with jurisdiction. This will reduce administrative burdens on both the OHRE and HRC, while also avoiding inconsistent outcomes and forum shopping.

For all of the foregoing reasons, the HRC urges the County Council to enact CB85-2021.
