Dear Howard County Council,

We, Girl Scout Troop 475 of Elkridge, strongly believe that it would benefit Howard County if the County Council authorizes the purchase the Camp Ilchester property as part of the FY23 Capital Budget. Camp Ilchester is a wooded area filled with flora and fauna. Many girls look forward to spending time at Camp Ilchester and if the Howard County Council does not purchase the camp it would be sold to developers. Not only would the girls be devastated but thousands of plants and animals would be killed if the property is turned into housing.



This graph from Howard County DPZ shows the percent of land use in Howard County. In the USA, 98% of land is green space, or land that is unused, preserved, or farmland. While 46% of green space in Howard County seems like a lot for a mostly suburban area, we could do better. If we add on to the 46% of green space by preserving the area at Camp Ilchester, we'll have more trees to produce oxygen, reduce flooding and property damage by keeping the existing pervious landscape, cool down the planet, and have more biodiversity in plants and animals.

If the county purchases Camp Ilchester, it will benefit the surrounding community. It would provide space for recreational activities including sport programs, outdoor adventure camps, a nature center, and nature based educational programs. There is already a nature center on the land so it would not cost more money to make one. The nature center can be used for outdoor experiences and education. There are also picnic tables, pavilions, fire circles, an archery range, and an amphitheater already there. There is also a nice public gathering spot in Clementine Peterson Activity Center, which many people enjoy using.

Parks and public lands serve an essential role in preserving natural resources and wildlife habitats, protecting clean water and air, and providing open space for current and future generations. Parks provide an essential connection for Americans of all ages and abilities to the life-enhancing benefits of nature and the outdoors. Nature conservation offers public access to safe, affordable, and healthy ways to experience nature. Additionally, the county's purchase would help preserve green space for the local community and it will be a win-win situation for the kids, our community, and our environment.

Protecting green spaces should be one of Howard County's first priorities. If Camp Ilchester is not bought, the plants and animals living on the property will have nowhere to live and will die. We need to help stop deforestation. Humans need trees for oxygen and they also help intercept rainfall reducing flood risk. The roots of the trees help stabilize the soil preventing landslides and runoff. The trees provide the habitat for all woodland animals.

Camp Ilchester is filled with vegetation, and vegetation helps with climate change. Vegetation helps cool the Earth's surface. This is because the trees and greenery provide shade for the Earth's surface. Vegetation also has a natural process called photosynthesis where the greenery takes carbon dioxide from the air and turns it into oxygen to release back into the air. This process helps with climate change

because when carbon dioxide is produced into the air, it builds up in our atmosphere. This buildup causes global warming. Maintaining vegetation, as found at Camp Ilchester, creates more oxygen and removes carbon dioxide lessening the effects of global warming. Vegetation also produces water vapor during photosynthesis. This water vapor leads to cloud formation which will help the climate because when the water falls from the cloud it helps grow more vegetation. Clouds also help alter the Earth's surface. With all of the benefits of vegetation to this world, why would we want to get rid of all the trees and other vegetation at Camp Ilchester?

Purchasing Camp Ilchester will also contribute to reducing flooding in Ellicott City. If the developers buy the land they will turn it into houses and roads (impervious surfaces). When it rains the impervious surfaces will become covered in water because there is no place for the water to be absorbed into the ground. It will also make flooding worse in other places because the water will not have been absorbed as it was when the property was a forest.

In conclusion, we are in favor of the Howard County buying Camp Ilchester. We hope that you take our opinion in account when making your decision. We would like to re-iterate buying Camp Ilchester helps protect our environment, prevent floods, and limit harm to our atmosphere. It helps bring people together and engage with their environment. We, the Smarter Growth Alliance of Howard County, are writing to express our support of the purchase of 5042 Ilchester Road, Ellicott City. We are requesting that you vote to fund the \$6 million dollar purchase. The former Girl Scout property, widely known as Camp Ilchester, is one of the last remaining forested natural areas available for public acquisition in the eastern portion of the county, and its preservation would add significant value to the County Park System. Notably, as a richly wooded landscape, the property offers vital natural habit for wood thrushes, tree frogs, luna moths, and other declining Maryland wildlife. The opportunity for county residents to experience woodland creatures and plant communities is also shrinking, and these 21 acres offer one of the last chances to protect a forested place for our human community to wander, relax, study, and learn.

Thanks to foresightful planning, Howard County residents can already access many playgrounds and facilities for soccer, tennis, and other active outdoor sports. In contrast, unstructured, wooded outdoor spaces for recreation are rare. Yet studies show that activities such as forest bathing, or mindful immersion in a wooded environment, benefits our physical, mental, and social health. In addition, school curricula require students to learn about the plants and wildlife in the dominant Maryland ecosystem—deciduous forest biome—yet few schools in the area have wooded grounds. Even more, public acquisition of the property would allow the county to

General Topic

Complete Streets-Laurel specifically improvement to Old Scaggsville Rd. I recently had an opportunity to learn more about HoCo's Complete Streets vision. The vision statement as noted in the <u>Howard County's Complete Streets Policy Statement</u> reads:

"To ensure that Howard County is a place for individuals of all backgrounds to live and travel freely, safely, and comfortably, public and private roadways in Howard County shall be safe and convenient for residents of all ages and abilities who travel by foot, bicycle, public transportation or automobile, ensuring sustainable communities Countywide."

Additionally The National Complete Streets Coalition defines Complete Streets as:

"Complete Streets are streets for everyone. They are designed and operated to enable safe access for all users, including pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists and transit riders of all ages and abilities. Complete Streets make it easy to cross the street, walk to shops, and bicycle to work."

As a Howard County resident, initiatives such as this serve as another example why I'm glad our family chose to reside in HoCo.

Personal experience

My family lives in the Honeysuckle Ridge neighborhood which is situated within a highly developed area off Old Scaggsville Rd. The surrounding communities are filled with beautiful diverse people, growing families including multi-generation households and fur babies of all kinds.

As I travel up and down Old. Scaggsville Rd. which is the main thoroughfare, I am anxious for those who are traveling on foot- caregivers with strollers, elderly, joggers/runners/walkers, students and public service workers. Some may call it overthinking or overcautious, I however cannot shake the awful feeling I get when people are unsafe- call it the Mama Bear in me or a deeply concerned resident.

In the 2 years we've lived in our home, I've watched the bus stops double and triple in size resulting in a need for our local schools to reassess their transportation routes. Understanding the nuances in transportation needs for elementary + middle schoolers compared to high schoolers is both exciting and unnerving. As they grow, physically, their social needs will too- they will want to visit their neighboring friends and eventually will be driving the same roads that have nearly zero room for error. The 5 elements that make up Howard County Complete Streets Policy, passed by Council Resolution 120-2019 on October 17, 2019 are: Sidewalks, Curb Ramps, Roadway, Crosswalks and Grass Buffer. Of the 5 elements, some areas on Old Scaggsville road do not have even 1 of the elements.

I urge us not to allow a tragedy to catalyze action on improving the walking and driving conditions on Old. Scaggsville Rd.

Stats

I'd like to wrap up my testimony with reviewing a few statistics from the WalkHoward plan that resonated with me.

The WalkHoward plan was adopted by the Howard County Council in February 2020 through Resolution 14-2020 as an update of the 2007 Pedestrian Master Plan. <u>WalkHoward: Moving Forward</u>, continues efforts to improve walkability in Howard County. Our community is happier, healthier, safer and more efficient when we have a system of sidewalks, pathways, bus stops and roadway crossings that make it easy to get around on two feet and in a wheelchair.

WalkHoward addresses walking in all of its forms – whether you are trying to get somewhere or just taking a casual stroll somewhere you love.

To develop WalkHoward, we [Howard County Council] completed a field assessment that examined **343 miles of sidewalks**, **915 intersections**, and **494 comments**, **3 public open houses** and an online survey and map that drew over **2,500 comments** and **36,000 "likes" and "dislikes."** With that data, we developed a draft plan that includes infrastructure and program recommendations, as well as structured projects that provide a framework for completing infrastructure improvements.

As I understand, there are no plans in <u>WalkHoward</u> or BikeHoward that include improving this area.

Direct ask

My direct ask is for funding for design, land acquisition and construction for sidewalks and multi-use paths to include the already identified components of complete and safe streets for all Howard County residents.

Support

I would like to take a second to thank Councilwoman Rigby (District 3) for being a strong advocate for walkability and bikeability in our county and community. She along with Colette Gelwicks and Felix Facchine have been incredible partners representing Howard County.

Councilwoman Rigby, as a member serving on the County's Complete Streets Implementation Team and backed unanimously by the Howard County Council, we eagerly anticipate improvements and believe you can do it!

Additional info on Adequate Public Facilities

In plain English, an APFO says that if the roads are too congested, if the school classrooms are too crowded, if the water system cannot provide enough water, if the sewer pipes or treatment plant are full, or if there are not enough playing fields for recreational use, then development can not be approved until the problem is corrected. At the same time, however, an APFO is not the appropriate tool to stop growth that is otherwise consistent with local zoning. The application of an APFO must be associated with must be associated with a funding source to remedy whatever the constraint on growth approval might be.
