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Supplemental Testimony Howard County Council 2/20/23

Howard County Council Bill 5-2023

BGE appreciates the opportunity to supplement the record before the second public hearing for CB 5-2023 and would like to again express our support for Howard County's decarbonization goals. We are also committed to aiding our customers and communities in identifying pathways, which equitably and affordably allow the county to meet and exceed its decarbonization goals without jeopardizing reliability by using an integrated energy system solution approach.

State Studies

As you are aware, the General Assembly directed the Public Service Commission to assess the capacity of each utility's gas and electricity distribution systems to successfully serve customers under a managed transition to a highly electrified building sector. The MD PSC study will leverage input from all the utilities on their ability to operate and maintain the electric system through its transition to decarbonization. The additional electrical load added to the grid will have an impact on system capacity and operations. We believe this information should be used to inform Howard County's plan toward electrification.

In addition to the general system planning study, the Climate Solutions Now Act directed the Maryland Department of Labor's Building Codes Administration to provide critical information that would significantly improve the ability of Maryland policymakers to select the best path forward to decarbonize buildings. The Department is required to present a final report by December 1, 2023.

There are several approaches to reducing the carbon footprint of the building sector. BGE believes Maryland legislators should not commit to a specific, limited decarbonization strategy without the benefit of the MD PSC and Maryland Department of Labor studies.

Costs

Concerns about costs multiply significantly when one looks at the impacts on energy costs. BGE projects that it will need to build or expand 250 substations and roughly double its feeder system to support building and transportation electrification in its service territory, with investments likely to exceed \$50B.

Beyond the financial impacts of the needed investments, the increase in infrastructure will require additional real estate for substations and the use of the public tights of way for the installation of infrastructure. The associated construction activity associated with this work will have a significant impact on traffic, the communities we serve and the county's roadways. An integrated energy system reduces the overall costs by \$8B - \$12B and minimize construction activity.

Given these critical dynamics – which affect all residents, not just those in newly constructed buildings – BGE believes policymakers should carefully select options that are shown to meet their carbon reduction goals with minimal impact to ratepayers.

Electricity Transition Context

An all-electric residential development may present what seems to be only incremental demands on the system, but the demands may look far more daunting when they include powering the development's electric passenger vehicles, electric service vehicles, schools, and electric school buses.

BGE believes significant planning and investment will be needed to meet these transitions, which rely on the same distribution infrastructure.

Dear County Council Members:

The County Council will deserve credit for putting the health and finances of Howard County residents first by passing CB5-2023, a bill that would require the County Executive to submit a report to determine the county building code changes needed to end the burning of fossil fuels in new buildings and major renovations. This report would be in advance of the next round of building code revisions, in the spring of 2024.

The Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) of the Jewish Federation of Howard County testified at the January 17, 2023 hearing in favor of CB5. The JCRC is submitting this letter in **support** of the subsequent CB5, as amended by the County Council, and scheduled for the hearing on February 21, 2023.

Howard County must be part of the solution to our climate crisis. CB5-2023 is essential if we are to stop burning fossil fuels in new buildings. In addition to reducing greenhouse gases, electrification of new buildings will benefit Howard County residents' pocketbooks and health.

Economic research indicates that most all-electric buildings cost less to build, and more importantly, that homeowners' and renters' ongoing energy costs for electric heat pumps and heat pump water heaters are substantially less. While the price of renewable energy is falling fast, a Maryland state agency recently completed a study showing that the delivered price of fossil fuels will increase up to 800% in coming years. Howard County residents and businesses do not want to be locked into these skyrocketing energy costs.

Accumulating evidence also shows that indoor gas combustion is a significant public health risk. Both the American Medical Association and the American Public Health Association have passed resolutions warning against gas stoves and cooktops. A peer-reviewed study published in December 2022 in the International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health found that "12.7% of current childhood asthma in the U.S. is attributable to gas stove use." Howard County residents deserve better.

Again, we want to make a strong statement of support for CB5-2023 so that Howard County can make progress toward accomplishing a cleaner, healthier future.
