Title: AN ACT making emergency appropriations pursuant to Section 610(b) of the Howard County Charter and amending the Annual Budget and Appropriation for Fiscal Year 2025 to provide additional spending authority in the Economic Development Authority for farmer grants; and declaring that this Act is an Emergency Bill necessary to meet a public emergency affecting life, health or property.

1 WHEREAS, Council Bill No. 27-2024 (CB27) is known as the Annual Budget and 2 Appropriation Ordinance of Howard County, Fiscal Year 2025 and contains the capital and 3 operating budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2025; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Maryland State Climatologist reported that in 2024 the summer months in Howard County have so far been among the warmest in county history, with mean 6 7 temperatures hitting 3.6°F above normal in June and 3.3°F above normal in July; the month of June was the third hottest June on record for Howard County, while maximum temperatures in 8 9 July reached the fifth warmest levels for this month in Howard County history; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Maryland State Climatologist also reported that in 2024 precipitation in Howard County has been drier than normal, totaling about half the level of normal precipitation 12 13 for the months of June and July, taking the County from abnormally dry conditions in June to 14 moderate drought conditions in July, which typically result in low water supply and damage to 15 crops; and 16 17 **WHEREAS**, the recent heat and drought conditions have posed significant challenges 18 for Howard County farms, leading to notable crop losses and a rise in input costs that negatively 19 affects County farmers and impact the broader agricultural community; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the County would like to provide grant assistance to farmers impacted by 22 this summer's drought-like conditions and to farmers impacted by climate change; and 23 WHEREAS, in order to provide such grant assistance, funding needs to be increased to 24 25 the Economic Development Authority, who will be awarding the grants; and 26 27 WHEREAS, funding will come from unrestricted fund balance in the Agricultural Preservation and Promotion Fund; and 28 29 WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 15.500 of the Howard County Code, the purpose of the 30

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1	Agricultural Preservation and Promotion Fund is to "protect the health, safety and well-being of
2	present and future residents of Howard County by advancing the sustainability of agriculture as a
3	viable sector of the County's economy;" and

5	WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 610(b) of the Howard County Charter, this Emergency
6	Bill is necessary to meet a public emergency affecting life, health or property.

10	Section 1. Be It Enacted by the County Council of Howard County, Maryland, that the following

12	the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2025, as shown below:

The Howard County Economic Development Authority, along with the Howard County Office of Agriculture, express their support for Council Bill No. _____, which will appropriate \$1,000,000 in Agricultural Preservation and Promotion Funds to a grant program for farmers impacted by recent heat and drought conditions.

Losses stemming from extreme weather conditions have tested the resilience of Howard County farmers this summer. These challenges have reverberated across various farming sectors, including commodity crop farms, produce growers, and hay producers.

Howard County is experiencing the detrimental effects of climate change. The Maryland State Climatologist reported that mean temperatures in Howard County reached 3.6°F above normal in June and 3.3°F above normal in July, making it the third hottest June and fifth hottest July in Howard County's history. This extreme heat was coupled with drought conditions brought on by rainfall that was roughly half normal levels over the same period of time.

For commodity crop farmers, the situation has been exacerbated by soaring input costs—such as seed, fuel, and fertilizer—paired with persistently low crop prices. Produce farmers have faced additional hurdles, incurred higher irrigation expenses while witnessed a decline in visitors to their pick-your-own facilities due to the relentless heat. Similarly, hay farmers are grappling with reduced harvests as drought conditions persist, and the timing of their third cutting is now at risk of frost damage. The repercussions of these losses are significant, particularly for livestock farms, which will experience elevated feed and hay prices and a shortage of availability.

Local farmers have shared sobering accounts of crop loss and increasing operating costs that threaten the health of their businesses and way of life. It is imperative that we stand together to address these pressing challenges and ensure that our farmers can continue to thrive amidst the adversities presented by this year's extreme weather.

This \$1,000,000 appropriation from the Agricultural Preservation and Promotion Fund will underwrite a grant program designed to provide vital support to our farmers who have faced significant challenges due to this year's extreme weather conditions. This program aims to alleviate some of the financial pressures created by this summer's weather.

This initiative is not just a lifeline; it is a commitment to sustaining agriculture in our community, empowering farmers to continue their invaluable work and contribute to the richness of our local economy. Together, this grant funding will foster resilience and support the backbone of our agricultural landscape.

Fiscal Impact

The fiscal impact of this legislation is \$1,000,000, using fund balance in the Agricultural Preservation and Promotion Fund.
