While Howard County has the capacity to pay for many amenities, we must remember that our public schools are the bedrock of our communities and the foundation of our economic growth, in addition to being mandated by state law.

In fact, the State of Maryland is mandating that we increase our commitment to education to meet the aspirations of the Blueprint for Maryland's Future. Howard County's Operating Budgets dating back to 2021 have cited "On average over 60% of general fund operating budget has been allocated for education in recent years." In FY2020, Our County Executive's first Operating budget proudly cited "Education is the top funding priority of my administration," later noting "County spending on education ... represents 64% of our total general fund resources."

So why the change in language? Successive budgets show a steady decline in Howard County's spending on education by the county executive's own measure: falling (to 61% in FY22, 59% in FY23, 58% in FY24, and most recently) in successive years to 55% for FY25. Increases in the dollar amounts allocated don't measure up to the increases in costs as measured by CPI-U.

Howard County has steadily backed away from its financial commitment to our public schools by any measure publicly available. The share of HCPSS general fund expenses borne by the county has dropped from 77% in FY2019 to 73% in FY26, letting the state bear an increased share of our obligation while starving HCPSS of available resources. As income and property valuations rose with inflation, per capita general fund revenue has remained relatively steady in inflation adjusted dollars, and in fact for FY25 is 8% higher than its highest recent value (FY09). That is incomes for everyone outside education. According to a November 20, 2024 article in the Baltimore Banner<sup>1</sup>, teachers settled for a 3.5% raise and HC Library staff were offered 2%, while county employees receive raises of 5-7%. All while middle and high school students had class sizes increase to the detriment of the broad and diverse curriculum.

You know how highly valued HCPSS' academic curriculum is and found a way to collaborate with our new Superintendent and Board of Education to avoid further reductions to academic programs in FY25 that represent the core of a school system's function. We expect that last year's public engagement will convince you that further reductions to academics will not be tolerated.

I call on you and our County Council to publicly commit increased funding sufficient to accommodate HCPSS' response to Mandates from Maryland's Blueprint to the Future, Commitments to employees and students (employee benefits, staffing Guilford Park HS, transportation) and supporting the best of our superintendent's worthwhile priorities to

strategically position HCPSS as a desired destination for students, teachers, and their families. I hope that he and the Board of Education will request sufficient funds to meet the demonstrated needs of our students and educators.

Employee compensation, closing gaps in special education staffing, and school safety and security all are places where strategic investment will help HCPSS provide educational opportunity for all students.

Years of underfunding HCPSS have left no more margin for finding efficiencies. Paper is rationed. Transportation for in-county music assessments has been reduced. Students at Mayfield Woods no longer have an opportunity to participate in science fair. The opportunities that distinguish a Howard County education are steadily being eroded away.

To The Howard County Council re Schools

I am part of the history committee for HoCo 250 and on the board of the Elkridge Heritage Society. (Nothing I say here reflects the views of either organization.) I have been studying the history of Elkridge as it relates to our nation's 250th anniversary, and the decades that followed. Elkridge used to be a real town with a real sense of community. I did not have the privilege of living here then so when I came to Elkridge in 1987, it had more of a feeling of suburbia. It was split in half by I-95 for one thing. Development was rapidly increasing, and I got to take advantage of that by moving into a house on Kara's Walk. But we worked, and shopped (other than the IGA) elsewhere until Elkridge Corners came along. Is this what America is all about?

Over time I came to realize that nothing about Elkridge development made sense. It is not walkable, or bike-rideable, and though my children attended St. Augustine School, I recognized that Elkridge residents were very concerned about public school capacity and wanted very much to have their own highschool again. My children went to Howard High outside Elkridge, but not that far. Other children in the community went to Long Reach, also not that far. But while there was lots of open land in Elkridge in the 80s, and even in the 90s, none of it was taken by the county for a highschool. The county did not have the foresight to predict the growth and plan for schools for families in developments that they allowed to be built willy nilly in a disjointed sort of way. They ended up putting an elementary school in Rockburn Park which was a travesty. Later they scrounged up the tiniest school land on Ducketts Lane for another elementary school. Oxford Square, while a charming neighborhood, is in the weirdest place surrounded by highways and business parks, and many of our children are sent to school there, which is now overcrowded.

The last attempt to lobby for a highschool ripped what community we had apart because the only obvious land was again Rockburn Park. The county finally realized they could not build in Rockburn Park (thankfully, in my opinion), and built in Jessup, a longer bus ride involving the bad traffic on Route 1. There was talk of using Troy Hill parkland for a school, which was more acceptable to some because we had not grown as attached to that park. But it was far from ideal.

This issue and other rifts resulted in the disbanding of the Greater Elkridge Community Association, brewed distrust and even hatred among our more vocal community activists, and broke the best system we had for speaking up for our area. We could blame ourselves and social media but ultimately it falls on the short-sightedness of the county government for allowing development without proper infrastructure.

Every so often the county comes up with a plan for a revitalization of Route 1, urbanization of Elkridge, some sort of town center, beautification of Lower Elkridge etc. But not much ever happens. We did fight for and get our own post office, library, and now community center. But look at where these things are! There is no connectivity, no sense of town, no highschool. One or two neighborhoods can walk or bike to the library. No one can walk or bike to the post office, and one neighborhood will be able to walk or bike to the community center. Most of our schools are not walkable or bikeable though I do appreciate some improvements made to Montgomery Rd for Elkridge Landing Middle School and Elkridge Elementary.

We can't undo the past. But we can make the future brighter. A highschool would do more than provide convenient commutes for our children. It will give them a sense of pride in Elkridge, a long lost sense of community, and maybe a desire to stay in Elkridge and build lives and businesses here. A highschool is more than a place for book learning and sports. It is an anchor for the community.

In my dreams we would have a highschool across Route 1 from the library with a pedestrian bridge or other safe passage (such as low speed limit and colorful crosswalk), and walkability from the highschool to the new community center. If I could get the post office somehow linked in through Harwood Park, my dream would be nearly complete.

I urge you to halt plans to expand schools in Columbia for Elkridge students. Elkridge is the oldest town in Howard County and deserves to become a real community again. Figure out a way to add school capacity for Elkridge students IN Elkridge!

Thank you in advance for taking the time to read my request and for any support you are able to give as we navigate this unimaginable setback in our school system. I have been a part of the HCPSS for over 40 years. First as a teacher, then as a parent, and now as a paraeducator in elementary school. What was once one of the wealthiest, most thriving school systems in the state, has now become one that fills me with panic and anger. Families move to Howard County with a perceived promise that their children, whether special or regular educational needs, will receive top notch instruction. I witness first-hand each and every day, that this is not possible with the staffing shortage and lack of resources our counting is experiencing.

As an educator, I feel that we are left to the wolves. I currently work in kindergarten where the need for support is critical and being ignored. We are overwhelmed with special needs students that are not receiving state mandated services because there aren't enough special education teachers and paraeducators to support them. As a result, my duties have shifted from students in the traditional classroom, to special education students. Because my time is taken away from the general education student, those who need interventions and additional support are also suffering. Sadly, I see this becoming the norm going forward. We have already been notified that we are going from four to three teachers next year, which is insane. We are already drowning with the student load of our neediest students, and the influx of new special education students is increasing. This past year has been the hardest. As a general education paraeducator, I know that our situation is not isolated. All schools in the HCPSS are suffering from teacher burnout, lack of services and the feeling of abandonment. We need help and cutting the budget is going to be devastating for all students and staff.

In addition to student needs, I don't think the BOE realizes how critical the role of a general education para is to the day-to-day functioning of each school. By cutting funds, next year's budget and how it will affect our salary is a slap in the face. Our job is not one that entails clerical duties. We do none of that for our teams. We are there to support the teachers and students, so that classroom teachers can do their job...teach. We get students in and out of buses and cars, we cover lunch and recess duty, we cover classes when teachers attend the overwhelming number of IEP meetings for current and incoming special education students. Just this week there are 5 hours of coverage needed for students. For the next few weeks, just as many meetings are on the calendar. We cover, if possible, when there are no substitute teachers available. Unfortunately, that has not been possible this year because we have one-

on-one daily responsibilities with special needs students. Yes, I'm a general education para working in special education every day. Again, we are pulled away from general education students that could use additional assistance. The students that we have in kindergarten this year are severe. Support staff are hit, bit, kicked, and spit on and there is little we can do about it. We are there for the students and we do our best to move forward. One in particular should have been placed in a regional program but was mainstreamed into our school. He is non-verbal, self-harming and gaining nothing from being in the regular classroom. By reducing the budget for students like this, they will not be placed in an environment where they can thrive, and the rest of the students are not receiving what they need. Everyone is hurting due to the lack of funds.

I am two years away from retirement. I have no idea how the budget is going to affect this. If there is a reduction in funds, will I, as a paraeducator, still receive the benefits that I was promised. Will it be worth it to stay in the school system if my situation changes. I was depending on the health care benefits that HCPSS offers retirees. My husband tells me to walk away, to quit, if this happens. This is not something that I can do. I'm not doing this for the money...I bring home approximately \$500 per week after deductions. That's less than \$100 per day. I stay because I love my school, its administration and my coworkers. We have an amazing PTA and community. It's just so incredibly disheartening to think that the Board will reduce what little I am already making for a job that I give over 100% to each day.

Since my original email, I've seen updated communications that the school system values the county as a partner, that we are in a difficult mandate environment and that the County is funding the school system above MOE and at historic levels.

These are process-oriented updates that offer context but no solutions. They do not drive towards the ultimate **outcome of appropriate class sizes and appropriate, significant and needed paraprofessional levels of support** among other attributes that our school system needs to be "world class." Please stay anchored towards these outcomes and ensuring we achieve them - do not get distracted by process and process-oriented success measures.

If the only way to achieve these outcomes is increased funding, then it is clear it is time to increase the funding. I don't have all (or any) of the answers, but I'm interested in an outcome-oriented update on our school system's class sizes and ensuring we have adequate paraeducator support, and it is clear more dollars are needed to achieve these absolutely critical goals. Paraeducators are incredible assets to our schools as an extra pair of hands to our overwhelmed teachers - I suspect the ROI on every position would be quite high if we were able to measure it. Just a few days in any classroom will convince you quickly that we should be seeking to grow our pool of paraeducators annually.

I recognize these are difficult choices, but at some point the answer becomes more and more clear - the school system must be funded at a higher level. I trust this leadership community will make the difficult choices necessary elsewhere in the County's budget to fund HCPSS at the level necessary so our students and school communities can thrive.



## <u>Comments in Support of Increasing FY26 HCPSS Operating</u> <u>Budget- Anthony DeBella, April 30, 2025</u>


Budget decisions always evoke tough choices and balancing this year's ever growing needs against resources that never seem to grow as quickly makes this year no different. This year, an additional \$74M<sup>1</sup> are necessary to meet the same need for HCPSS as last year. The four major sources of that increased need are illustrated below



This is the very much UN-surprising result of the gradual reduction in the percentage of growing available resources allocated to education. The accepted measure of this balance of resources is the percentage of

available general revenue funds allocated toward that legally mandated need. In the past few years, general fund revenue has been significantly augmented by prior years funds made possible by consistent budget surpluses, which are NOT available for use for school system operating expenses. This year, Spending Affordability Advisory Commission has advised using less prior years funds. That is the only area of the county executive's proposed budget with significant reductions. Every other area of the proposed budget continues its steady growth enabled by growth in available recurring tax revenue. Consider the allocation to HCPSS including associated debt and OPEB relative to the recurring general fund revenues available for HCPSS, that is, the general fund budget without use of prior years funds not permitted for use in operating expenses. That analysis shows that despite the significant amount of new tax revenue allocated to public schools in the county executive's proposed budget, the proportion of available funds dedicated to HCPSS is still lower than at any time. Any apparent uptick in the proportion of general fund revenue dedicated to the schools is the result of decreasing use of prior funds by approximately \$100M. This trade off speaks volumes about the relative of priority of education relative to the other needs of the county.



During an economic downturn in 2011, the county executive's budget book comments cited funding reductions from state sources and how Howard County increased funding for education despite having to cut a corresponding amount from the rest of the county budget. Then, Howard County was forced to furlough employees, hold 200 county positions vacant, and close offices over the winter holidays. The measures proposed by the county executive for FY26 pale in comparison. The proposed level of funding for HCPSS for 2026 puts teachers and students at the forefront of county cost saving measures. Hardly the way to demonstrate education is a priority. Asking county employees to increase their contributions to their benefits merely asks them to make "almost" the same 15% cost share as HCPSS teachers (15 - 15.8%) already do. General Fund investment income has greatly exceeded budgeted levels for the past three years<sup>2</sup> and that recurring revenue should be used to support current year education expenses rather than future PayGo. County Council should include revenue such that an additional \$10M in investment income <sup>3</sup> realized by the county can be used as the basis of restoring \$30M to HCPSS above the County Executive's proposal such that the superintendent's same services level funding can be achieved.

Dear Howard County Council:

I am a community member and parent in Elkridge, with two young children in Howard County Public Schools. I am writing to you today to ask you to fully fund the Board of Education's FY26 operating budget request.

Superintendent Barnes described his proposed FY26 Operating Budget as a same services request, asking only for more special education staff, moderate staff compensation markers, and additional security assistants. After listening to the people of Howard County – your constituents – the Board of Education added funding for athletic trainers and instructional team leaders on top of what the superintendent proposed.

The request that the BOE made to the County Executive is the direct result of effective constituent advocacy and encouragement for them to ask for what they'd need in order to provide the high-quality education our county's children deserve. The BOE's budget request would return HCPSS to receiving around 59% of the county's budget, the level it last received in 2019 (which was low by historical standards, as the share was 60% or more in the early teens). The massively reduced budget sent to you by the County Executive would fund HCPSS at a historically low 56% of the county budget, showing a lack of care for our children. The County Executive's proposal is a disservice to the children of our county and a slap in the face to our educators, asking all of them to deal with reduced services, instruction, and even larger class sizes.

Last year, programs like elementary gifted and talented (GT), 3<sup>rd</sup> grade strings, and BSAP – programs that make HCPSS unique – were on the chopping block when the BOE proposed a budget that didn't go much beyond "Maintenance of Effort." These programs, along with special education, athletic trainers, and so many more important and enriching programs matter to the citizens of Howard County and the well-being of our children. Last year, the County Executive, Council, and the BOE received numerous complaints from the community for the BOE's lowballed FY25 request, so it should come as no surprise that the BOE course-corrected for FY26. The BOE's FY26 request is grounded in essential services with rock solid justification for every dollar. It is not aspirational nor is it extravagant. It is what the community needs to grow and thrive and what HCPSS – our CHILDREN – deserve.

Howard County wants to be seen as a place where everyone is welcome and valued. We like to talk about valuing equity and ensuring our youth have opportunities. But if the

BOE's FY26 budget request isn't fully funded, the BOE will have to make cuts. And it will end up being those special programs like 3<sup>rd</sup> grade strings, elementary GT, and social studies clubs like speech & debate that are cut. There will be staffing cuts so that class sizes may end up exceeding the current maximums (33 students/teacher in middle & high schools, 31 students/teacher in grades 3-5, and 25 students/teacher in grades 1-2). However, if the County Council funds the full FY26 HCPSS budget, it means HCPSS can maintain current class sizes and retain these opportunities for students to develop executive function skills, logical & critical thinking, public speaking, group work, and so much more. Studies have shown that students engaged in the arts often show improved cognitive skills, better concentration, and enhanced problemsolving abilities. These benefits extend beyond the classroom and positively influence their academic achievements. I've seen that with my own children, as learning to read music and play the viola unlocked their ability to read books, a skill they had struggled with for years. Thanks to learning the viola in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, my child went from struggling to read picture books and simple graphic novels to now joyously reading Harry Potter or Narnia books as a 4<sup>th</sup> grader. We should ensure that all of our students – our children – have access to these types of programs that unlock the joy of learning like it has for my child.

I wish I could testify in person this evening in support of the BOE's budget proposal, but I am running my elementary-aged children to their activities this evening, one of which is a program called MESA – Maryland Math, Engineering, and Science Achievement, a brainchild of our own Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Lab. MESA is an after school program for students in K-12 run by willing teachers to help provide students hands-on experience with science and engineering solutions to real-world challenges. This year, elementary students could choose to create a planetary lander, wearable technology for babies, an amusement park ride, or a device to pick up trash from water or land. While school PTAs provide funding for the program, only 25 of our schools had teachers with the energy to run this program for our students. If you fail to give HCPSS the funding requested by the BOE, the teachers we will have left will be too demoralized and burned out from teaching their ever-larger classes and having to make due with even less to provide such amazing extracurricular activities for our students.

I frequently see complaints in community groups on social media about youth having nothing to do after school; the Mall in Columbia has even imposed restrictions on youth in the mall. But the programs the BOE would likely cut if you don't fully fund their FY26 budget request are just the sort of programs to engage kids in productive activities. We should be expanding these opportunities – programs like MESA and debate and Model UN that are provided through the schools - because that is the one place kids can definitely get to every day. Howard County likes to bill itself as one of the best places to live in the US. We brag about Columbia being ranked as one of the Happiest Cities in the US, one of the top places for Jobs in the US. But we won't retain those rankings if our school system becomes less than, as that will make Howard County a less desirable place to live. Do you want that to happen during your tenure? Because it WILL happen if HCPSS isn't fully funded for what it NEEDS in FY26. A restrictive budget that leads to cuts isn't maintaining effort since so many valuable programs would end up on the cutting room floor. Failing to fund the BOE's FY26 budget will take our county backwards, not forwards.

I and many others in the community believe there is enough room in the budget. Howard County has the funding for the school system. Possible sources above tax revenue include the larger- than-budgeted earnings from investment funds, which are currently outpacing both the FY25 budgeted amount and FY26 projections. Members of our community have also noticed that the SAAC estimates of additional revenue are extremely conservative and have created wide gaps in actual earned revenue, which turns into Pay Go money and does not prioritize the school system.

Last year, HCPSS experienced staff reductions and program cuts. Class sizes got bigger, and teachers had to do more with less – limits were even placed on how much paper teachers could use and subscriptions for electronic resources (ebooks for classroom use and other electronic learning tools) were cut. We are counting on Council's leadership in these uncertain times to do what is necessary to maintain excellence and prevent class size increases and staff reductions from happening again this year. We ask that you show us your commitment to our public schools by fully funding the HCPSS FY26 operating budget.

## FY26 OPERATING BUDGET – PUBLIC TESTIMONY – EDUCATION

Good evening members of the Council,

I am Terri Marcus, President of the PTA Council of Howard County, and I am testifying tonight on behalf of the thousands of PTA members in the county.

As a voice for parents, teachers, and students, I am here to simply ask you to restore as much funding as possible to the school system to bring it as close as possible to the Board of Education's requested budget. It is very discouraging to have to be here once again with our hands out asking for money, especially when I think we all started off the year feeling kind of hopeful because we finally had the school board submit a budget that more truly reflects what the actual needs of the school system are. I want to emphasize that this is still a step in the right direction, even if we know full funding is likely unattainable in any particular year.

After Mr. Barnes' presentation to the school board last night, we know HCPSS needs at a minimum, \$29.2 million, just to cover existing services, such as employee compensation and benefits and to meet existing service commitments. Finding this \$29.2 million should be job #1. If that's possible, why stop there? Restoring a full \$54.3 million will allow the school system to meet their "other priorities". These "other priorities" are not luxuries. They are things like adding security and special education positions, math and reading teachers and specialists, middle school principals, and athletic trainers. Any number between \$29.2 and \$54.3 million would obviously allow some of these priorities to become reality. It is to every citizen's benefit, whether you have a student or not, that HCPSS retains its reputation as an excellent school system.

Just like you as council members, PTA representatives don't get to pick and choose specific spending priorities that benefit one group over another, but there is one thing we can advocate for – and that is to provide enough funding that we can avoid another across-the-board class size increase at any grade level. We just did this last year. It is hugely detrimental to all the students and to staff. Mr. Barnes very reluctantly made mention of class size increases last night, but he

made it clear that it is once again a very real possibility. Programming and staffing cuts could also very well be on the chopping block again.

The county executive's proposed budget informs us that of the \$1.187 billion dollar budget for HCPSS, \$801.5 million of that will come from the county with the remainder coming from various other sources. The county is to provide \$39.3 million above MOE, \$1.5 million in one-time PAYGO funding, and \$6.7 million in employee pension costs that were dumped on the county from the state. Dr. Ball's budget mentions that the funding growth to HCPSS "accounts for approximately 55% of all new county General Fund revenue growth this fiscal year." <u>https://www.howardcountymd.gov/sites/default/files/2025-</u> 04/Fiscal%20Year%202026%20Proposed%20Operating%20Budget%20Book 0.pdf

My question is: Why only 55%? Where is the other 45% going? What is the argument for it not going to the school system? That \$801.5 million going to HCPSS of the total \$2.3 billion county operating budget means that HCPSS is receiving only 34.85% of the total operating budget. That percentage seems low if education is, in fact, a priority for the county.

As your work sessions progress from the capital budget to the operating budget side of things – we would also urge you to uphold the medical principle to at least do no harm. Do not pass any new legislation that creates exemptions or undercuts funding to the school system. Do not set yourselves up for even tougher decisions in the future by reducing the amount of revenue available to meet the school board's requests year after year.

We know that all of you value education. We have seen your work in previous years to restore funding to the school system when possible. Please continue to demonstrate that commitment to your youngest and most vulnerable constituents and to their families who pay a lot to keep this whole system going. So, I wish you all good luck and just ask that you keep all the students and parents and teachers in mind when making the tough decisions ahead.
