The administration received two questions from County Council members on February 20, 2015. I am providing answers to these questions below.

# *Question* #1:

# *Please share the Administration's research on sustainability offices in Frederick County and Baltimore City.*

The administration researched initially how surrounding jurisdictions in Maryland defined sustainability as a government practice. The definitions are diverse as are the departmental makeups of comparable agencies. The administration's goal was to develop as comprehensive a definition as appropriate to recognize the growing movement in sustainability cited by literature, academics, and sustainability professionals. The administration found Frederick County and Baltimore City as the most emblematic of the model being envisioned for Howard County. For this reason, these jurisdictions were highlighted in testimony presented on February 17, 2015.

Frederick County's Sustainability and Environmental Resources Office emphasizes an intersection of economics, society, and the environment. It focuses on protecting the environment, conserving energy and living sustainably. Key work areas include promoting sustainable resources and initiatives to the government and community, expanding watershed management through pollution prevention, educating the public, and assessing current societal conditions.

Baltimore City's Office of Sustainability develops and advocates for programs, policies, and actions by government, citizens, businesses, and institutions that improve the long-term environmental, social, and economic viability of the City. The City also integrates sustainability



into its government's operations as a management practice. Links to websites for both agencies are provided below.

While evidence on best practices from around the state, particularly the two jurisdictions discussed above, is valuable, the administration researched how sustainability is treated in academic circles. Multiple Maryland colleges and universities offer environmental science programs, and reviews of their curriculum show an emphasis placed on statistics, economics, government, and business coursework. Nationally renowned universities such as Harvard, Columbia, Stanford, Johns Hopkins, and the University of Michigan have graduate programs dedicated to sustainability management and systems. These programs are designed to help students and professionals master a richer understanding of what makes for a sustainable environment. The coursework is interdisciplinary, qualitative, quantitative, management-oriented, and policy-driven.



## *Question* #2:

Please provide a timeline for the implementation of this reorganization (with more detail of how you expect the transition to unfold within the office).

The administration's goal is to have OCS's work plan in place and ready for implementation on July 1, 2015, the start of FY2016. The administration has taken a number of steps toward this objective. First, the Acting Director of the Office of Environmental Sustainability (OES) conducted a staff review of all personnel funded within OES and by other county agencies, and with funds from partner organizations. The approximately 8 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions that report to the OES director encompass a variety of talent, skills sets, and education. They have over 27 years of collective experience working in Howard County government, 90 years of professional experience overall, collegiate and post-collegiate degrees in science, business, and engineering from well-respected institutions both within and outside Maryland.

The administration gave careful consideration to needed qualifications and capabilities as they relate to OCS' new mission, and how the office should be structured as a policy arm of government under County Administration. A multidisciplinary sustainability office should be designed to incorporate a variety of subject disciplines that can research, analyze, and respond to initiatives important to policymakers, elected officials, and the broader community. As is the nature of relying on collective input, sustainability goals may change periodically as federal, state, and county priorities change.

A review of the resumes for existing OES staff indicates previous academic exposure to environmental, agricultural, and economic policy. In addition, the types of projects upon which these professionals have embarked over the past eight years indicate practical work experience in these fields. Given the successful implementation and outcomes of many of these programs, the administration is confident in their ability to conduct a variety of intersecting research projects that consider environmental, agricultural, and economic assessments simultaneously.

Second, the administration looked at how OCS and the Environmental Sustainability Board (ESB) would function best in county government. Councilperson Ball and Councilperson Terrasa touched on this issue in their questions about the role the Environmental Sustainability Board (ESB) would play when advising the new office on non-environmental policies.

The administration concluded the new office would work with many agencies, boards, commissions, and communities in Howard County to ensure that future business growth, environmental protection, and agricultural improvements are executed in a sustainable manner.



For example, in its development of program initiatives OCS would rely on relevant Howard County government agencies, boards and commissions whose employees/members are subject matter experts in their fields, and whose insights would contribute to comprehensive proposals the County Executive considers tasking departments with implementing.

This is not dissimilar to how OES has operated over the past eight years. As has already been done for certain projects, OCS would form committees with appropriate agency staff to develop policy recommendations and program implementation models that support the agency's work. For example, OES established the Stormwater Subcabinet to aid in the development of the watershed fee, improve the County's MS4 permit program, and monitor the effective use of the Watershed Protection Fund. The subcabinet comprised both department heads and bureau chiefs who 'touched' stormwater management as part of their organization's mission.

The administration intends to assemble similar groups for most new and existing initiatives. For example, OES is currently reviewing the prospect of engaging with private entities on the financing and development of new stormwater projects, which is a timely endeavor as the County must soon seek to remediate stormwater runoff on private land. To Councilperson Weinstein's question at the public hearing, the value of public-private partnerships in environmental management is a perfect example of the type of research the new office would conduct.

Finally, it is envisioned representatives from the following boards and commissions would meet quarterly: Agricultural Land Preservation Board, Planning Board, Design Advisory Panel, Economic Development Authority, Transportation Board, Environmental Sustainability Board, Recreation and Parks Board, Public Works Board, and the Soil Conservation District. The administration met with the chairs from each of the boards listed above in preparation for the new office's inception. As a result, it is the administration's opinion that it is unnecessary to alter or condense any of the County's boards and commissions whose duties encompass sustainability.



Thank you for hearing my testimony this evening. My name is Lori Lilly and I live in Woodstock. I work part-time for our County's Restoring the Environment and Developing Youth (READY) program and also have recently started my own environmental consulting business operating out of Howard County. I live at the Howard County Conservancy where my husband and I serve as care-takers and where we do our best to live a sustainable lifestyle with our family. To me, this means growing my own vegetables in the summer, purchasing foods grown locally, consuming goods wisely and in accordance with my values and supporting efforts that protect and restore our natural resources, especially here in Howard County. I am actively involved with the Howard County Watershed Stewards Academy as well as with the Ellicott City Partnership's Clean Safe and Green Committee where we are focusing our efforts on community outreach and education regarding flooding, trash and other Town concerns. In my local efforts, I have worked closely with several County Departments. I've found the Office of Environmental Sustainability to be the most helpful and effective County Department for supporting my citizen-based work. I, along with 32 other citizens, wrote to County Executive Kittleman and the County Council in early December, describing how much we value this County Department and requesting that you support the functionality of OES by leaving budget and staffing intact and re-appointing a new Director.

I came here tonight, thankful that the OES is still intact, and to offer support for Bill 3-2015 that would broaden the scope of services of OES to include economic and agricultural sustainability and change the name of the department to the Office of Community Sustainability. As someone that works tirelessly on behalf of protection and restoration of natural resources in Howard County, as a strong supporter of local agriculture and sustainable food systems, and as a small business owner, I think that this change to the OES will be very beneficial to the economic and environmental engines in our County. With the East/West divide that we have and the unique mix of urban, suburban and rural land uses, the Office will be better positioned to serve as a central organizer and administrator of sustainability initiatives across these three sectors. That being said, I am a little concerned about the scope of the Office being expanded to these sectors with "no fiscal impact," which I assume to mean that no additional staff or resources will be supplied to undertake these new efforts. In the world of environmental regulatory compliance, we hear the term "un-funded mandate" frequently and, although I generally am supportive of this change in the Office in principle, I hope that the means necessary to carry out the new mission is adequately supported. I do not think that any of us would like to see a well-intentioned initiative fall flat on its face due to inadequate resources.

In closing, I hope that you will support the broadened scope and name change for the OES per Bill -2015 and trust that you and the Administration will look carefully at the details of the proposal to ensure its successful launch.

# Environmental Sustainability

For 8 years Howard County has had an Environmental Sustainability office. This office has mainly promoted sustainability in the environment which I feel is very important. Farming has always been an important part of our local economy with production in dairy and livestock, corn, and small grains. As well as hay, pasture, tree fruits and vegetables also add to the diverse agriculture environment we have in Howard County.

Agriculture in Howard County has been a vital part in life of my family. We are one of the three dairy farms that still operates in the county. The two others are the Jones family on Underwood Road and lager family in Fulton. We all have many generations that have been involved in operating these farms over the years.

Our family has been a member of many of the farm organizations that we have in the county. A few include the Farm Service Agency, Farm Bureau, Land Preservation Board, Howard County Fair Board, Western Shore 4-H Show which is held at the Howard County Fair Grounds. There are many families that have done the same as we have done to promote agriculture in the county. My daughter serves as the 4-H leader for the Howard County Dairy Club with a membership of 87 kids. This may seem strange with only 3 dairy farms in the county, but with a 4-H leasing program offered members who may live in small area's or developments can lease an animal and help care for it at one of our farms and then exhibit the heifer at the county fair.

Even with only 3 dairy herds there are 300 farms in the county. Where land holdings in the county comprise approximately 25% of our county's total land area. I have tried to tell you how important that I feel agriculture is in Howard County.

Just a few weeks ago we held an agricultural roundtable meeting at the TLV Tree Farm. The agriculture community got together with county government to have our concerns heard and discussed.

Good evening and thank you for this opportunity. My name is Dr. Joel Goodman, and I live at 3700 Cattail Greens Court in Glenwood 21738. I'm here to speak in favor of the legislation regarding the proposed Office of Community Sustainability. I speak for myself, but considering transparency, I should note that I am chair of the Howard County Recreation & Parks Advisory Board and, recently, I served on the County Executive's Transition Team for Rec & Parks.

When I first heard of this legislation, I,like many,was concerned that the loss of the word "environmental" from the name of the Office would mean that environmental issues and conservational advocacy would be pushed to the back burner. However, as I read the bill, spoke with folks around the County, and thought on it, I was filled with optimism that the expansion of the scope of the Office's responsibilities will actually strengthen its ability to develop and advocate for environmental programs, policies, and actions. I must note, however, that this optimism is tempered with caution.

This Council has heard me testify about dark skies and smart lighting solutions - issues which have both environmental AND economic implications. The other day, I read in the paper that - as part of proposed budget cuts - funding for a pilot street lighting conversion project may be cut. I'll reserve my detailed comments about that for later outside of this testimony.

However, this is where my cautious optimism comes in. I don't believe that a program like the pilot lighting

conversion project would be cut if the Office of Community Sustainability had input. Such an office will be most effective because it will have ALL of the informed players at the same table. This way, it will have both the resources and interest going forward to identify and assess ALL reasonable methods which may assist the County in the long term to address issues of environmental impact and reduce our collective carbon footprint.

Finally, the portion of the proposed legislation which speaks to the Office working closely with all boards is music to my ears. The proposed periodic meetings of the redefined Office with the chairs of County boards and commissions will be of great benefit for all of us to stay informed firsthand.

The above referenced Council Bill reorganizes the Executive Branch of County Government pursuant to Section 403 of the Howard County Charter. The Bill revises the duties and responsibilities of the Office of Environmental Sustainability (OES), and changes its name to the Office of Community Sustainability (OCS).

OES, envisioned in the 2007 report produced by the Commission on Environment and Sustainability, was created in order to help Howard County develop into a model green community, and has done a great deal of work over the course of the past eight years to achieve that end. To date, the Office has focused on initiatives to create a more sustainable society almost exclusively through an environmental perspective. This administration believes through its review of current literature and research that creating a truly sustainable society requires more than an environmental perspective, but an economic and agricultural one as well. It is with this in mind that this administration recommends the broadening of the Office of Environmental Sustainability's duties and responsibilities to assess the economic, agricultural, and



environmental impacts of all sustainability initiatives. This intent is reflected in the Office's proposed name change to be Office of Community Sustainability (OCS).

OCS will provide the County Executive with a more comprehensive approach toward developing a sustainable society in Howard County. The Office will be charged with conducting the research, developing policy, and coordinating with various agencies throughout the government that have a specific role in achieving the desired initiatives. The Office will serve to research said initiatives, identify the stakeholders within county government that play a role in implementing the program or project, and have the authority to coordinate across agencies to implement the County Executive's desired strategies. The new office will work with many organizations, boards, commissions, and communities in Howard County to ensure that future business and agricultural development is executed in a sustainable manner.

Additionally, the Office will have the capacity to develop new financing strategies in order to support infrastructure needs associated with stormwater remediation. This new direction will provide OCS, and the County Executive, with the tools necessary to set Howard County on the path toward long-term viability of its infrastructure and natural resources. This bill will make no changes to the Environmental Sustainability Board, whose role will remain to advise OCS on policy and implementation.

### **Fiscal Impact**

The Administration anticipates that this Bill will have nominal, if any, fiscal impact.
