

Dear Ms. Sigaty, and Members of the Howard County Council,

During the April 30, 2015 Council work session for the Judiciary, Council Members asked for clarification of two items. First, the Circuit Court was asked to provide projections for equipment replacement including servers and mixers used for courtroom operation. Second, the Circuit Court was asked to provide more information on budget line items that were cut below FY2015 levels and the effect those cuts will have on Court operations. We have provided information in chart form for organizational purposes and for convenient reference.

With respect to equipment, below is a list of equipment, not supported by the State, maintained at the Courthouse:

Ms. Sigaty inquired whether we had a contingency budget as some other departments have; to which we replied no. However, after further discussions with the Budget Office, we have identified funds that can be used as a contingency if equipment fails, and we do not have the funds to cover replacement costs. Our General Fund match for our child support contract is submitted as a draft projection. Because the contract is on a <u>federal fiscal</u> year, the County funding is spread between two County fiscal years. The submission is in draft form because the final contract has not been executed. With regard to the General Fund match portion of the child support contract, for some past years, and presently, the Court has funds that were not/have not been spent. Those unspent funds revert back to the County. The Budget Office has agreed that those funds could be considered our contingency funds for FY2016 if we have an equipment failure. That is a satisfactory plan for the Circuit Court.

With respect to the cuts to our General Fund budget which brought line items below FY2015 levels, the cuts are as follows:

Budget Line Item	Decrease from FY2015 Levels	Impact on Operations
Training (conference fees, lodging, meals, ground transport, circuit judges mtg)	\$5,050	Judges, Magistrates and staff will not be able to attend conferences during FY2016. We retained enough funds to cover mandatory continuing education for the Court Social Worker's licensure and fulfill obligations for staff in multi-year programs. The semi-annual Circuit Judges meeting will be held in Carroll and Anne Arundel Counties, but funding will be needed in FY2017 to cover meeting costs for Howard County's obligation to host the meeting.
Law Library (County Share Op. Expenses)	\$10,000	The Circuit Court Law Library is the only law library for the County. The Court will absorb this cut in County funding by using additional funds in the Library Trust Account which is funded by appearance fees. This depletion in funds cannot continue into future fiscal years as any surplus in the Trust Account will eventually be consumed leaving inadequate library funding.
Equipment Maintenance	\$10,563	The Court will be moving its jury management system to a shared State platform. Expenses for the maintenance of the new system will be transferred to the Maryland Administrative Office of the Courts. We were planning to use the savings to replace equipment listed above, however with requested reductions below a flat budget, this is a savings that will be passed to the County General Fund. The Court has developed a contingency plan with the Budget Office for equipment detailed above. Without functioning courtrooms the Court will not be able to fulfill its constitutional mandate.

Personnel Costs	\$34,056	A vacant Office Assistant II position will be frozen. The position had been frozen since FY2010, but the County approved the refunding of the position for FY2015. Prior to filling the vacancy in FY2015, the County re-froze the position. The Office Assistant II duties include maintaining the courtrooms and transporting files and pleadings to and from courtrooms. The Courthouse has had to reallocate space within the building to maximize use, and the Courthouse has many floors and offices that are not accessible by elevator. The files need to be reviewed by different departments which may not be in close proximity to each other. With our limited space, the Court has had to maximize its use of hard to reach areas, and the Office Assistant would have been a great asset which would have improved the flow of the 8000 cases per year we process.

For future budget cycles, the Court will discuss equipment contingencies with the Budget Office. As stated a satisfactory contingency plan has been developed for FY2016. The Court appreciates the Council's approval and input, allowing us to fulfill our constitutional mandate. If you have further questions or concerns, please advise, and we will do our best to provide additional information.

Dear County Council Members:

Bicycling Advocates of Howard County (BAHC) writes to urge you to include substantial funding to support and promote bicycling and other active transportation modes in both the 2016 capital and operating budgets.

The County Council has long encouraged pedestrian and bicyle transportation. BAHC also recognizes and thanks the County Council for its history of supporting a complete streets policy. The 2016 budgets are a necessary starting point for encouraging pedestrian and bicycle transportation, and for implementing a complete streets policy.

BAHC asks you to consider the significant returns that investing in active transportation will bring. Numerous studies and anecdotal evidence show that investing in active transportation creates an important business asset for the community. The returns go beyond the obvious - public health - to increased business activity and jobs.

In our testimony before the County Executive earlier this year, BAHC gave examples of the financial returns from implementing complete streets and active transportation policies. In addition to the more obvious -- the more than twofold growth in Howard County bicycle shops -- is that bicycle and pedestrian friendly communities both generate more business for local merchants and, although less easily quantified, contribute immensely to quality of life which can be a deciding factor for an employee or a business considering locating here.

We look to the County County to lead Howard County forward. BAHC urges you make adoption of the already prepared Bicycle Master Plan a priority. That Plan has many projects that the County can easily and economically implement, so we urge you to include appropriate funding in the 2016 capital and operating budgets. The return will be positive for the entire County.

Dear Mr. Kittleman,

On behalf of the Patapsco Heritage Greenway, I respectfully request that Howard County provide \$100,000 in funds to match our Maryland Heritage Areas Authority grant fund request.

These funds will immediately allow us to leverage \$100,000 in state funds to promote the Patapsco Heritage Area. We cannot access these Maryland State funds without a County match.

There are only 13 Heritage Areas in Maryland and just one in Howard County. As a Certified Heritage Area, Howard County now has access to additional Maryland State funds earmarked for Heritage Areas including operating, project and capital funds. This year there is over \$3 million available to Heritage Areas. In addition to our grant request for \$100,000 in State funding, we have \$22,000 in pending project grant requests for Howard County Tourism, the Historic Ellicott City Partnership and the Patapsco Heritage Greenway. These funds will support projects that will bring visitors to Ellicott City, Elkridge and the Patapsco Heritage Area. They will promote visitors and boost our Main Street businesses in Ellicott City and Elkridge. In addition, we will have access to over \$10,000 for mini-grants to support our local partners in their efforts to promote the Heritage Area.

As a Heritage Area we are supported and encouraged to apply for additional Maryland State and federal grant requests. In the past week we learned of two new opportunities. The National Park Service has \$500,000 in grant funds that will provide up to \$75,000 in match-free funds to support underrepresented communities equal access to the National Register and, thus, additional federal funding. Specifically, these funds cover sites that have played a role in our African American, Hispanic and LGBT history.

Last week we were apprised of funding from the Maryland State Highway Administration of approximately \$17 million for design and construction of nontraditional transportation projects such as bicycle and pedestrian facilities, restoration of historic transportation buildings (think B&O Railroad Station) and creation of trailheads. Up to 80% of an approved project can be funded with these grants.

In addition to partners and stakeholders, Senators Kasemeyer and Bates as well as Delegates Lam and Hill, and the entire Howard County Council supported our FY2016 grant request to the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority.

The Patapsco Heritage Greenway has worked hard for this certification that will bring money to Howard County in the form of Maryland State and federal grants, tax credits, and tourism dollars, but we need your continued support to move our goals for Howard County forward and maintain our certification.

Please amend the FY2016 budget to include this critical funding. It's an investment that will grow our future.
