The purpose of CB42-2015 is use fund balance to increase FY16 General Fund appropriations by \$340,000 in fiscal year 2016 for the following:

- This bill will Increasing Program Revenue Fund revenues and expenditures for donated funds received by the Department of Fire and Rescue Services has no impact on the County's overall fiscal year 2016 budget. Although the bill provides DFRS with the authority to spend up to \$150,000, it can only spend up to the actual amount received as donations.
- The County had originally intended to give a grant to the Community Action Council (CAC) in fiscal year 2015 but the funding was eliminated as part of the 2015 spending reduction plan. The CAC wants to relocate the Howard County Food Bank main office/distribution center. The proposed funding represents a match of a \$290,000 grant from the State of Maryland. According to Beta Dayhoff, the \$580,000 will be used for acquisition of a new location for the Food Bank. Additional funding will be required to pay for any planning, design, construction, repair, renovation, and capital equipping. According to Ms. Dayhoff, they will seek additional Federal and State funds for that purpose.

Ms. Dayhoff advised that its proposed new space at 9385 Gerwig Lane in Columbia will more than double its square footage allowing for increased storage and distribution capabilities. According to Ms. Dayhoff the new facility is very close to an existing bus line on Guilford Road.

NOTE: Although CAC stated that it has discussions with the County about using existing County space, it was decided that there was no currently available space that met CAC's needs.

• One-time funding of \$50,000 for the benefit of Oakland Mills is to be used by the Department of Planning and Zoning. DPZ is to partner with Columbia Association, who will contribute an additional \$25,000 in funding, to complete a comprehensive master

plan/feasibility study and financial analysis for the revitalization/redevelopment of the Oakland Mills Village Center. According to the Administration \$75,000 will be adequate to perform the study.



Hello, my name is Dwight Mikulis and I'm on the Board of Directors for Community Action Council, or CAC and I'm here this evening to give testimony supporting the funding bill in order for us to have adequate facilities for the Howard County Food Bank.

I'd like to thank the Council for the opportunity this evening and also for your support of CAC over the years and its mission of advocating for the poor in Howard County. In fact, three County Council members were able to attend just last week our Annual Holland Dinner that recognized 50 years of service by the CAC in Howard County. Thank you Dr. Ball, Mr. Weinstein and Mr. Fox.

I would like to quickly acknowledge other supporters of CAC tonight in our audience which including other Directors, staff and community members served by CAC.

My introduction and path to CAC was pretty simple, naturally my wife Diane got me involved.

Diane received information on the One Month's Rent program that CAC has to help in the short term families or individuals that have a temporary set-back. We both thought what a great way to try and break adverse outcomes if someone could just stay in their house or apartment until employment improved.

Jump ahead two months and I had an opportunity to be on the board of CAC which I joined in January of this year. Although we are concentrating this evening on the funding for one important piece of CAC service which is the Howard County Food Bank, CAC really has multiple services to try and lessen the effects of poverty and provide assistance to Howard County families in need.

Now to the critical issue about the need for CAC to increase the ability to provide food for needy individuals and families in Howard County. The funding provided by the County Council would match an already awarded matching grant at the State level, so actually tonight's funding is worth double. The Food Bank would be relocated to a building owned by CAC that would increase our warehouse capacity and the Service Area for customers thereby giving us the ability to better provide for the already 27,000 individuals and more in the future.

Imagine a location where Food Bank customers including children would not have to line up outside the building in all types of weather because of not enough space inside for them to sit.

Imagine where our customers could properly choose food items in an area at least bigger than a  $10 \times 12$  room. Imagine where users could learn about the other CAC services like weatherization and temporary assistance, in privacy, instead of literally sitting in the warehouse with volunteers working nearby.

I spent a day this summer working the warehouse, bagging groceries, filling meat and vegetable freezers carrying food to vehicles and stacking shelves and I came away with real appreciation for the work done by CAC employees and volunteers in a space that is completely inadequate to the current needs of the community not even counting future needs.

We are very fortunate at this time to have state funding along with restored funding through this bill and I strongly encourage the Council to support the CAC and the poor of Howard County.

Community Action Council Food Bank Proposal Testimony by Bita Dayhoff Howard County Delegation October 19, 2015

Good evening Madam Chair and members of the Council:

Thank you for the opportunity to give testimony on a project of high importance. I am Bita Dayhoff, President of Community Action Council of Howard County. And I am here in support of County Bill 425-2015 which provides funding towards the purchase of a site to house the Howard County Food Bank.

CAC is Howard County's designated anti-poverty organization serving the needs of the low income population. Approximately 5.5% of Howard County population lives in poverty and according to the Maryland Hunger Solutions, more than 22,000 Howard County residents are food insecure.

Our agency understands this information firsthand. We live it every day as we try to support low income families overcome a multitude of struggles. Our mission is to diminish poverty, enable self-sufficiency, and advocate for low income families and individuals. We achieve our mission by providing services that include Head Start, energy assistance, weatherization, and housing assistance services such as eviction prevention.

In addition, CAC operates the Howard County Food Bank and that program is the reason for my testimony this evening. The Food Bank is the largest hunger relief entity in Howard County which has been operated by CAC since its inception in early 1980s. It's a healthy Food Bank where by we provide access to nutritious food products as well as organic fruits and vegetables that are grown at our own garden.

Currently CAC operates its food bank in a 2,900 square foot space off of Rt. 108. We've occupied the space for approximately 10 years. When CAC moved into this location, we were serving approximately 3,600 individuals per year. However, the request for food assistance has drastically increased since 2008. Since then, our

distribution has increased by 480%. In FY 2015, the Food Bank distributed more than 680,000 pounds of food to 27,000 individuals – right in Howard County.

Based on the first quarter of FY 2016, we anticipate this number will continue to grow. It is simply not safe to serve 27,000 individuals from a facility that is designed to serve a couple of thousand.

The lease for this location expires in June 2016 and in anticipation of the termination of the lease, CAC requested and received, under the leadership of Senator Guy Guzzone, state funds to secure a permanent location for the Food Bank. As you know the state funds must be matched 100%. The County Executive Kittleman has included this match in the budget and for that we are grateful.

At the existing location, the space is extremely limited and our clients line up outside for hours at times before it is their turn to be served. Imagine if you were an elderly woman with a walker and had to stand outdoors in the dead of the winter or the heat of the summer, imagine if you were a mom with two little ones in a stroller and you had to wait outside when it's raining, or snowing so that you could feed your family. Our families deserve better. We hope you can help us help them.

Many of you have attended our Thanksgiving Turkey Distribution; many have helped us for the Martin Luther King Day of Service. You have seen firsthand how tight our space is. You have seen firsthand how it takes hundreds of people to set up in order to serve thousands of Howard County residents who would go hungry if not for the efforts of our small nonprofit organization.

CAC, in pursuing ownership of a larger location, will assure long term security for continuation of this much needed service in Howard County. Additionally, CAC will have an opportunity to create a comprehensive service delivery center which not only meets the food needs of families, but provides other services such as energy and housing assistance.

I thank you for your favorable consideration of this important bill.

Good evening, my name is Bill McCormack Jr. My address is 9569 Patchin Court, Columbia, 21045. Ginny Thomas and I are testifying as the Co-Chairs of the Oakland Mills Village Board. We have asked our residents to send emails to you rather than appear here tonight.

We support Council Bill 42-2015, lines 19 through 24, which provide one-time funding from the use of the fund balance in the amount of \$50,000 to benefit the Village of Oakland Mills which will be used by the County's Department of Planning and Zoning for master planning efforts to include a concept development plan, feasibility study and financial analysis for Oakland Mills.

Plan Howard 2030, Section 10, Community Design, focuses on the older village centers in Columbia as some of the targeted areas for revitalization in Howard County. The revitalization of Wilde Lake is well under way with several new structures in place, and the revitalization of Long Reach already has significant county financial involvement in the planning process.

A key tool in this revitalization process is the Village Center Community Plan. Oakland Mills filed this resident created, board approved document in May with Planning and Zoning. We are ready to take the next steps with a feasibility study. Hopefully, much of what is learned in the feasibility study in Oakland Mills can be very useful in the revitalization of other older villages, like Harper's Choice and Owen Brown, and in other areas in the county.

The Columbia Market Study, sponsored by the county and CA, focused on the retail area in Oakland Mills. In our Community Plan we have defined the village center area to encompass the retail area, professional offices, interfaith center, CA facilities, condominiums, apartments and schools. This was done to take a comprehensive view of all possibilities for our village both now and in the future.

The \$50,000 is an investment in Oakland Mills. A revitalized village center and surrounding area would have a very positive impact on property values. Property tax assessments in Oakland Mills have significant upside potential. Over time the increased property tax receipts from Oakland Mills would repay the county many times over.

On behalf of the residents, businesses and patrons of Oakland Mills, I ask you and urge you to approve the \$50,000 for Oakland Mills.

Fifty-nine percent of subsidized housing is in Oakland Mills, Long Reach, and Owen Brown, according to 2013 county figures. ### **School Progress**

With the new accountability program approved under Maryland's Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Flexibility Application in 2012, student achievement on reading and mathematics, and other academic indicators of attendance rate and graduation rate are measured under School Progress. The Annual Measurable Objectives (AMOs) reflect school specific baseline data from 2011 with a target year 2017. In 2013-2014, a select number of students in most schools field-tested the new PARCC Assessments and were not tested on the MSA in that content. Therefore there is not complete data for the State as a whole. Progress is still reported against AMOs for all students statewide, at the LEA level and at the school level in the subject not field-tested.

The seven School Improvement Grant (SIG) Schools and Carroll County Schools double tested and therefore have complete MSA data. High Schools did not participate in the field test and therefore have complete accountability data. The population at the State and LEA level was not greatly impacted by the field test. Therefore, School Progress can be calculated for school year 2013-2014 for the seven SIG schools, all Carroll County Schools, High Schools, the State, and the LEAs.

### **Annual Measurable Objectives (AMOs)**

The AMOs are on a trajectory toward 2017, the time by which each individual school is expected to reduce its percent of non-proficient students for each of its subgroups and overall by half. The progress of each school toward meeting its own unique targets provides valuable information over time on the effectiveness of instructional strategies, the inherent needs of the students, and the extent to which the school is fulfilling those needs. For 2013-2014, a select number of students in most schools field-tested the new PARCC Assessments. Due to the non-participation of all students within a school, AMOs were not measured in the subject area field tested at the school level in schools that ield-tested. The seven School Improvement Grant (SIG) Schools and Carroll County ichools double tested and therefore have complete MSA data. High Schools did not participate in the field test and therefore have complete accountability data. The oppulation at the State and LEA level was not greatly impacted by the field test. Therefore, progress on AMOs can be calculated for school year 2013-2014 for the seven IG schools, all Carroll County Schools, High Schools, the State, and the LEAs.

### 'articipation Rate

articipation Rate is based on the number of students enrolled on the day of testing. ederal regulations require that at least 95 percent of the students enrolled on the sting day take the test. Students who are unable to take the test at the regular time or uring the make-up time because of a medical emergency do not count against the shool's participation rate. Students who took the PARCC field test in place of the MSA o not count against the school's participation rate.

#### ttendance Rate

tendance Rate is the percentage of students in school for at least half of the average hool day during the school year. Attendance is a school accountability measure for ementary and middle schools. Yearly targets are set for attendance so that by the end school year 2013-14, the State, schools, and school systems should have achieved and aintained an attendance rate of at least 94 percent.

### **Teacher Qualifications**

The percentage of teachers in each category is based on the number of teachers who have credentials and are teaching core academic subjects as defined by the federal government under the No Child Left Behind Act. The core academic subjects are English reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages, civics and government, economics, arts, history, and geography. Teachers who are teaching other subjects are not included in the totals.

**Standard Professional Certificate:** A Standard Professional Certificate indicates the teacher meets all certification requirements.

**Advanced Professional Certificate:** The Advanced Professional Certificate requires three years of satisfactory professional school-related experience, and a master's degree or a minimum of 36 semester hours of post baccalaureate course work.

**Resident Teacher Certificate:** The Resident Teacher Certificate is issued to a teacher in an approved alternative preparation program at the request of a local school system superintendent.

**Conditional Teacher Certificate:** The Conditional Certificate is issued only at the request of a local school system superintendent to an applicant who has a bachelor's degree but does not meet all certification requirements.

**Highly Qualified Teachers:** "Highly qualified" is specifically defined by federal law. Teachers must meet minimum requirements both in content knowledge and teaching skills. Teachers must have a bachelor's degree, full State certification, and demonstrate content knowledge in the subjects they teach.

### **Cohort Graduation Rate**


The U.S. Department of Education now requires each state to use an adjusted cohort graduation rate for school accountability. The adjusted cohort graduation rate ensures that all students who entered 9th grade together are counted in the graduation rate at the end of 4 years and at the end of 5 years.

The cohort graduation rate data for 2013 is the 4-year rate for the student cohort entering grade nine for the first time in fall 2009 and graduating no later than 2013. The 2013 5-year rate is the same cohort graduating no later than 2014.

Analysis of CB42-2015

The purpose of CB42-2015 is use fund balance to increase FY16 General Fund appropriations by \$340,000 in fiscal year 2016 for the following:

- This bill will Increasing Program Revenue Fund revenues and expenditures for donated funds received by the Department of Fire and Rescue Services has no impact on the County's overall fiscal year 2016 budget. Although the bill provides DFRS with the authority to spend up to \$150,000, it can only spend up to the actual amount received as donations.
- The County had originally intended to give a grant to the Community Action Council (CAC) in fiscal year 2015 but the funding was eliminated as part of the 2015 spending reduction plan. The CAC wants to relocate the Howard County Food Bank main office/distribution center. The proposed funding represents a match of a \$290,000 grant from the State of Maryland. According to Beta Dayhoff, the \$580,000 will be used for acquisition of a new location for the Food Bank. Additional funding will be required to pay for any planning, design, construction, repair, renovation, and capital equipping. According to Ms. Dayhoff, they will seek additional Federal and State funds for that purpose.

Ms. Dayhoff advised that its proposed new space at 9385 Gerwig Lane in Columbia will more than double its square footage allowing for increased storage and distribution capabilities. According to Ms. Dayhoff the new facility is very close to an existing bus line on Guilford Road.

NOTE: Although CAC stated that it has discussions with the County about using existing County space, it was decided that there was no currently available space that met CAC's needs.

• One-time funding of \$50,000 for the benefit of Oakland Mills is to be used by the Department of Planning and Zoning. DPZ is to partner with Columbia Association, who will contribute an additional \$25,000 in funding, to complete a comprehensive master

plan/feasibility study and financial analysis for the revitalization/redevelopment of the Oakland Mills Village Center. According to the Administration \$75,000 will be adequate to perform the study.

Such a study could act as a model for the county to use to ensure that older neighborhoods remain viable and do not succumb to decay that has occurred in many older suburbs around the country. A prime example of what we want to prevent is what has happened to the surrounding suburbs in the Atlanta metropolitan area. By only focusing on new development in targeted areas, the older suburbs have become havens for poverty, failing schools, prone to blight, absentee landlords, and the failure of many businesses. However, it has been proven over and over that a combination of redevelopment combined with new development leads to unbelievable reversals in established neighborhoods. A prime example of this is the Navy Yards area in Washington, DC.

I have noticed a trend in Howard County to build new luxury apartments in older neighborhoods to spur redevelopment. However, that is not enough. There is an over abundance of apartments in the eastern part of the Columbia, but a lack of new single family homes. Let's face it, many people would love to build their home from scratch, but in Columbia that is not allowed. By looking at the Navy Yard example, instead of simply renovating existing older apartments, the city decided to have a public/private partnership to redevelop the area with new homes, apartments, and commercial businesses. The success of this redevelopment is astounding; however it is also extremely sad that it took the city decades to literally start from scratch. Can you imagine the success Columbia neighborhoods would have by entering in a similar public/private partnership to redevelop the land surrounding these older, blighted apartments with similar housing and commercial development found in Maple Lawn? It would ensure that all of Howard County would stay the premier county in Maryland as well as become the model for other areas around the country. I have lived in Howard County since 1999 (in Owen Brown and Hickory Ridge) and each of my two children participated in sports. My son played hockey for several years for Atholton and for the Huskies and my daughter swam for several years for the Clippers and both did CNSL for 10 years +. I have been all over Maryland at various venues for both sports.

Other jurisdictions have these facilities and they are used extensively. From my personal experience, I can see that Howard County has failed to capture the sizeable economic activity that a quality sports venue generates. The restaurants and hotels, just to name several beneficiaries of such facilities, for the many events a premier facility (such as a 50 meter competitive swimming pool or a high quality replacement for CA's hockey arena) can run into the \$ millions if there were as few as 10 events per year at our new facilities. On a yearly basis, there can be many more as new, quality, facilities become recognized state-wide.

Most importantly our facilities are over used and inadequate. There is so much demand for all the hockey programs that ice time for the many high school programs and club teams in the County is very limited.

There is always a waiting list to participate in the Clippers swim program and we swim at the Navy, Fairland and St. Mary's College (to name a few) when we have significant meets, and a patchwork of other facilities for less major swim meets. Our team is relegated, for its over 300 swimmers ages 6-18, to working out at the swim center and the Supreme Sports club and conducting its swim meets in the HCC swim pool that must be close to 40 years old. There is a huge demand for indoor swim space as our generous supply of outdoor pools are generally only available from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

I recommend that Howard County invest in such facilities to pay back its thousands of citizens and their children for their continued sacrifice. Adult masters swim and hockey teams will use these facilities as well. Right now there is both a shortage and inadequacy of our current sports facilities. Perhaps we can even form some type of public-private partnership to help defray some of the cost the County and CA would need to get these new facilities built and in use.

Many of us have been asking for this for more than a decade. The time to act is now.

The Office of Budget requests amending the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for FY 2016 (CB-23-2015) to account for the following adjustments to the General Fund: (1) providing matching funds (\$290,000) for a State grant to Community Action Council to be used for the Food Bank; and (2) including funding (\$50,000) to partner with the Columbia Association Board of Directors to complete master planning efforts for the revitalization of the Oakland Mills Village Center. Both amendments are one-time initiatives funded through PAYGO or use of fund balance, and will increase the Non-Departmental Expenditures by \$340,000. In addition, we request amending the Program Revenue Fund in the Department of Fire and Rescue Services to include \$75,000 for Emergency Medical Services and \$75,000 for County Stations. Actual spending in this program revenue fund will be monitored to ensure expenditures stay within actual revenues collected.
